REVISING THE HYMNAL OF ANGLICAN CHURCH

What the Committee Has Done and Left Undone and What It Might Do.

"Let me make the ballads, and who will may make the laws," said Fletcher of Saltoun, and the thoughtful hymn-writer might similarly say as much of religion. It is, therefore, a matter of great satisfaction, as it is of the first importance, to find that of the first importance, to find that the new Episcopalian hymnal, "The Book of Common Praise," is such a collection as the Christian world may well rejoice to possess. The fourth draft preparatory to the final revision has just been distributed, and the committee will meet on Feb. 20 to conclude their task. While we have some suggestions and one or two earnest protests to make it would be ungracious to speak of them first when the whole book gratifies in almost every particular the sense of dignity, of proportion, of breadth of view and charity of purpose so much to be desired in such a work. The catholicity of the collection is such that all branches of the Protestant communion could find it sufficient for their needs, and churchmen may be glad to nion could find it sufficient for their needs, and churchmen may be glad to feel that members of other bodies could take up the book and not feel disappointed in looking for familiar strains of praise and comfort. When the churches can all sing from a common hymnbook as they read from a common Bible, unity is not beyond imagination.

The draft report of the compilation committee is a document of great interest and embodies the principles which might govern the compilation of any general hymn-book short of a cyclopedia of sacred song. Seven hymn-books, it appears, have hithertobeen in use in the Anglican Churches of Canada.

"It was felt by every one," says the report, "that the time had arrived when all parties in the church could work sympathetically and enthusiastically together in the preparation of a hymnal of which the guiding principle should be 'unity by inclusion and not by exclusion,' and that in such a hymnal as "The Book of Common Praise' all churchmen might unite upon the broad and Catholic lines of "The Book of Common Prayer." It was the object of the committee "that in the selection of hymns and tunes the book be as representative as possible of all legitimate schools of thought and taste within the church." Steps were taken to gather the sense of clergymen, organists, and others who love to dwell on ...e more intimate consolations of the Comforter—"But Kind and Good, With Healing in Thy Wings."

One more protest. If "Shall We Gather at the River?" is to be rendered in the "Hymnal Companion" version to the adventure acknowledges its indebtedness to the Irish Hymnal. 
