**Winston's Bride.**  
Writes the Marquis de Fontenay: Winston Spencer Churchill's fiancée, Miss Clementine Hozier, is a remarkably fascinating and clever girl, having inherited her good looks and her charm from her mother, Lady Blanche Hozier, to whom several men have lost their hearts in the past and who has been the heroine of more than one romance. Fair haired, slim, graceful and with classic features, she has been to a great extent brought up by her wonderful old great-grandmother, the wife of the second Lord Stanley of Alderley, and afterward by her aunts, Lady St. Helier (formerly known as Lady Jersey) and Lady Red-eade, who is not only her aunt, but also her godmother. She has likewise been around a good deal in society with a third aunt, the widowed Countess of Arlre, who lost her husband in the Boer war, and who is lady-in-waiting to the Princess of Wales. Her father, Colonel Sir Henry Hozier, who died a year ago very suddenly in Panama, was for many years secretary and permanent chief of that wonderful London institution known as Lloyd's, which is ready to underwrite anything save a horse race. He had an eventful career, having served as an officer of royal artillery in the China and Abyssinian campaigns, and having acted as military attaché at old Emperor William's headquarters during the war of 1890 between Prussia and Austria, and four years later in the Franco-Prussian struggle. The old kaiser was extremely fond of him and took advantage of a feat of bravery on the part of the young man, rescuing a wounded soldier under heavy fire to bestow upon him the Iron Cross during the siege of Paris.

The Hoziers are an old Scottish family, who have been territorial magnates in Lanarkshire for a couple of hundred years or more, the present head of the house being the second Lord Newlands, nephew of Sir Henry, and a great cousin, therefore, of Winston Churchill's fiancée. Lord Newlands formerly served in the foreign office, for a number of years was private secretary to the late Lord Salisbury, is grand master of the Free Masons of Scotland and is married to a daughter of the third Marquis of Esexter. His principal home, and, indeed, the ancestral seat of the Hoziers, is Mauldelle Castle, Lanarkshire, which was formerly a royal domain, and in 1235, on the occasion of the marriage of the son of King John Balliol to a niece of Philip of France, was assigned as part of the security for her dowry. To readers of Sir Walter Scott's "Mauldelle Castle" and the surrounding country will be interesting owing to its being portrayed by him in a particularly picturesque manner in "Old Mortality" as the scene of the struggle of the Covenanters and of the battle of Bothwell Bridge. Built from designs of Adam, the castle's magnificent situation on the banks of the Clyde, which flows along Lord Newlands' park for several miles.

Like her future husband, Miss Clementine Hozier has a number of relatives in this country. In fact, she is mourning the death, last May, of her American aunt, Mrs. Lyulph Ogilvy, who was the daughter of a Colorado ranchman of the name of Boothroyd and failed to meet with the approval of her husband's relatives in England. Indeed, the Hon. Lyulph, who is a brother of Lady Blanche Hozier, and like her, one of the children of the late Lord Ogilvy, quarrelled with his relatives to such an extent about his wife that he broke off relations with him and stopped the allowance which he had been receiving. This, in conjunction with the failure of crops and bad luck with his cattle, rendered him unable to pay the interest on the mortgage with which his big ranch in Weld County, Colorado, was encumbered. In consequence thereof foreclosures ensued, and Lyulph Ogilvy, with his wife and two children were obliged to abandon their home and to migrate to Denver, where, at the time of his wife's death last spring, they were occupying a workman's cottage, dependent entirely on his earnings of \$15 a week as night watchman of the Union Pacific freight depot. Yet Lyulph Ogilvy is a member of the Marlborough and of other of the smartest clubs in London and has been decorated by King Edward with the Distinguished Service Order for conspicuous gallantry in the South African war. Two lives, namely, those of his nephews, the present Lord Arlre and the latter's younger brother, both boys under the age of fifteen, lie between him and the Earldom of Arlre, along with the possession of grand old Cortachy Castle, in Perthshire, and valuable estates, extending over an area of nearly one hundred thousand acres, in England and Scotland.

**DESPERATE DUEL**

**Constables Fired on by Italians Who Resisted Arrest.**

PARRY SOUND, Aug. 20.—Constable Knight and District Constable Madigan had a desperate fight with an Italian who escaped from jail here. Learning that Frank Sparano, one of a trio that escaped, was working in a field near Byng Inlet, the constables went to the place. Sparano had stolen a repeating rifle, and as the constables advanced toward him he opened fire.

The Italian fired five shots, the constables replying with their revolvers. Constable Knight, feeling to have been hit, fell to the ground among some bushes. Constable Madigan, imagining his companion was killed or seriously wounded, started for Byng Inlet to procure assistance. Meanwhile, as soon as Knight was reassured the Italian had emptied his rifle, he got up and advanced toward the man, who, turning to run, was struck in the thigh by a bullet from Knight's revolver.

It so badly that five stitches were necessary to close the wound. The constable, however, felt the Italian with the butt of his revolver. He was just able to handle his prisoner before he became exhausted from the wounds.

**EIGHT CHILDREN BURNED**

Six Dead and Two Will Die—A California Horror.

COLFAX, Wash., Aug. 20.—Six children are dead and two others are burned so seriously that recovery is doubtful at the H. W. Schultz ranch between Colfax and Brouse, resulting from a fire that destroyed their home last night.

Four of the dead were children of Schultz. The other two were children of W. V. Fox, a brother-in-law. The men were away harvesting and the mother was attending a theatrical performance.

The two oldest Schultz girls attempted to rescue the children, but lost the way to the door and were forced to drop the babies to make their own escape.

The cause of the fire is a mystery.

**ASKED FOR INCARCERATION.**

Brockville Man is Admitted to Asylum at His Own Request.

BROCKVILLE, Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Mr. H. PHILLON, a married man with a family, who came here from Montreal, applied at the local asylum, and was admitted as a patient.

He was sent back up town to consult with physicians and after an examination by two doctors the necessary papers were made out.

**DIPLOMATIC CHANGE.**

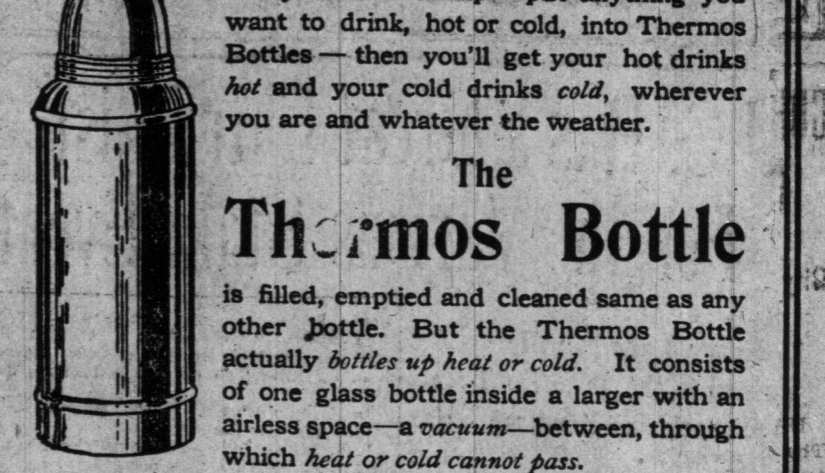

**FIRMS SEE NO BENEFIT IN REMOVAL OF EMBARGO**

Would Not Increase Number of Store Cattle and Would Hurt Scotch.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The opinion of prominent dealers in Canadian meats at the central market, Smithfield, differs somewhat as to the advantages to be reaped by them thru the removal of the embargo on Canadian cattle, but all agree that the Scotch and English farmer would be benefited by the removal of restrictions.

Among several interviewed were Gartons, who handle largely colonial meat; they doubted if the dealer would derive any benefit, but the removal would allow more meat being supplied, Canadian store cattle were far ahead of Irish, as they fattened and made better meat.

Canadian exporters of live cattle were at present making quite as much if not more than they would by shipping store cattle.

Duckworth & Son, while allowing that the free importation of Canadian stores would benefit trade in many ways, yet it is not the quantity they deal in but quality; and if the restriction were removed Canadian cattle could be sent to Scotland, and there fed up and sent to London as Scotch meat, which would hurt the Scotch trade, as the Scotch is considered the best sent to London. He doubted even were store cattle allowed to come in whether the Canadian farmers would send any more than they do now.

The Cooper Company are satisfied that the Scotch farmer would benefit by the removal of the embargo, but not the meat dealer. As for the much talked of combine behind these, there was none. American shippers had far more money invested in the business than English, and perhaps in certain ways worked together, as did at times the English dealers. It was a very large question, and an exceedingly difficult one on which to express an opinion, but if the removal of the restriction cheapened meat he was there in favor, as at present meat is too dear.
