



NEW YORK, June 22.—The Herald has the following cable from Pekin:

A despatch from Hankow states that the viceroy of Hu-Peh and Hu-Nan provinces has arrested and place in close confinement four high officers of the eighth division of the new army, including the generals in charge, who are charged with being actively engaged in revolutionary propaganda.

The promptitude of the viceroy is believed to have nipped in Ne bud a movement to create a military league to control the army and thru it the government.

The critical situation in Hu-Nan is intensified by heavy floods in the northern section. Chang-Teh-Fu reports that the loss of life is enormous and the population are starving.
