The lowest prices that are quoted in the west for feed wheat is 22 cents to get into his meal him. Receipts of live stock at the City Market on Wednesday and Thursday, as reported by the railways, were 139 car loads, composed of 2182 cattle, 1422 hogs, 3209 sheep and lambs, and 158 calves.

The quality of the cattle on sale was no better, the only difference being that there was a larger number of the common to inferior classes and not as many good, in proportion. There was a fair trade, but prices were lower generally for the inferior class.

Exporters.

H. & W. Murby report a fair enquiry for good quality heavy steers, 1100 to 1150 lbs. each, at prices ranging from \$3.50 to \$3.90 per cwt.; other classes were unchanged as follows: Best feeders, 1000 to 1100 lbs., at \$3.25 to \$3.60; best stockers, 800 to 900 lbs., at \$2.50 to \$2.65; best stockers, 600 to 800 lbs., at \$2.25 to \$2.60; medium stockers, 600 to 800 lbs., at \$2 to \$325; common stockers, 500 to 700 lbs., at \$1.50 to \$1.75. 
