On Sundays, as usual, in the forenoon the boys are marched to divine service at one of the Protestant churches, and in the afternoon Sunday School is conducted by the Superintendent in the Institution.

Due attention is given to recreation, out-door games, such as cricket, base-ball, quoits, etc., during summer, while in winter months the reading room is made available after working hours.

The conduct of the boys either at work or at play is quite satisfactory, no breach of dicipline occurring which required severer punishment than in ordinary school life.

In concluding my report I may state that our system of management has been substantially the same as in previous years, our main reliance for reformation is placed in moral training. We endeavour to educate the conscience of the boys, to lead them to consider the nature of moral action, to understand the difference between right and wrong. This work of moral training is not confined to any particular hour of the day but is given line upon line, precept upon precept, seeking to use the most common circumstances of life to inculcate the truth, endeavouring in all our teaching to lead these boys to have faith in God, to rely upon themselves and to fear nothing but wrong doing.

I desire to express my gratitude to Mr. Kennedy, our school teacher, for his valuable assistance rendered to myself, and the many acts of kindness shown to the boys at all times, also to Dr. Lindsay for his kindness and ever ready attendance to the calls of the Institution.

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
