AFRICAN LABORERS FOR SOUTHERN FRANCE

With regard to the scheme for sending South African natives to France, 2,000 Cape boys, or half-caste natives, are being forwarded in advance of the 10,000, for whom arrangements were originally made.

FINE OF \$5,000 IF YOU HAVE A HEARST PAPER IN POSSESSION

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—In reference to the exclusion of the Hearst newspapers from Canada—anyone in possession of such papers after Nov. 11 is liable to a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or imprisonment for five years, or both.

The papers banned are the New York "American" and "Journal," Boston "American" and "Journal," Chicago "Examiner" and "Herald," Los Angeles "Examiner" and "Herald," and Atlanta "Georgian" and "American."

Fifteen daily and Sunday papers are included in the list.

LAST MINUTE ELECTION REPORTS

Last Minute Notes. New York, Nov. 8.—Charles E. Hughes today adhered to his determination of last night to make no comment on the returns till the result of the election was determined beyond doubt.

He was especially interested in returns from California, Minnesota, Nebraska and Missouri. Early advice to him were that the last named two states were in doubt with a steady republican trend as returns came slowly in.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 8.—T. B. Kennedy, secretary of the state republican committee, at ten o'clock said: "The returns indicate that Wilson and Kendrick have carried Wyoming."

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Alvin T. Hart, manager of Republican headquarters, says that Hughes and Fairbanks have carried Indiana, North Dakota, California and Minnesota and that the Republican national ticket has won at least 272 electoral votes, or six more than the required number.

Early Morning Figures. New York, Nov. 8.—At 4.45 o'clock this morning the returns, while still incomplete, made Wilson reasonably certain of 292 votes in the electoral college and seemed to give Hughes 215. There were eighty-one votes still in doubt. The number required for an election is 266.

Advance by Russians. Petrograd, Nov. 8.—A further advance by the Russians near the Roumanian border was announced officially here today. Austro-Hungarian forces east of the Jul Valley have received reinforcements and assumed the offensive.

About the Gas Burner. A woman's thimble is said to have been the means of suggesting the first gas burner. William Murdoch, the inventor, first burned the gas simply as a flame from the end of a pipe. One day in an emergency he wished to stop the illumination. Hurriedly looking around for something, Murdoch seized his wife's thimble and thrust it over the light, which was immediately extinguished. There was a strong odor of gas, however, and the experimenter applied a light to the thimble, discovering that it was full of holes, through which tiny jets of flame appeared. The importance of the result was that the illumination from those two or three tiny jets was much brighter than had been given by the great flare from the end of the pipe.

The Wheat Market. Chicago, Nov. 8.—Opening prices, which ranged from the same as Monday's finish to 7-8 higher, were followed by a material reaction, but then a fresh upturn higher than before.

Death of Miss E. Rainsford. Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 8.—Miss Elizabeth Rainsford died at her home in Kingscliff last night in her eighty-ninth year. She is survived by one brother, William Rainsford, with whom she resided. She was the daughter of the late Capt. Charles Rainsford of the Old 104th Regiment, who distinguished himself during the memorable winter march to Quebec during the war of 1812. H. B. Rainsford, clerk of the legislature, is a cousin.
