

ORDERS UNLIKELY  
TO BE CANCELLED?

(Montreal Gazette.)

New York, Nov. 25.—Suggestions that  
the Allied governments plan to cancel  
many of their orders for shells and other  
munitions here, following the cancella-  
tion of one rifle contract, may be dis-  
missed as not worthy of serious consid-  
eration.

England and France, it is claimed, are  
now able to supply all their munition  
needs. Similar claims were made six  
months ago, just before large shell or-  
ders were placed here. And munition  
orders are being placed even now.

Only a month or so ago contracts for  
3,000,000 fuses were let to the American  
Explosives Company; New York Air  
Brake, within a fortnight, closed orders  
for 2,500,000 cartridge cases, and 1,600,000  
detonating fuses; and the Scoville Man-  
ufacturing Company is understood to have  
taken a large fuse contract. Inquiries  
for French shells are now in the  
market, and will probably be placed  
soon.

This hardly looks as if the Allies can  
depend entirely on their home factories  
for their needs. The facts are that there  
has been a great deal of talk over cer-  
tain contracts. The Russian contracts,  
as has been reported by Dow, Jones &  
Company, had only recently to be mod-  
ified and the time for their fulfillment ex-  
tended to April 1, 1917.

But concerns which have given satis-  
factory deliveries and goods on original  
orders, and are now engaged in filling  
further contracts, are not in the slightest  
danger of having cancellations.

Specific statements that shipments of  
rifles for the French government have  
practically ceased imply much less than  
the facts of the case warrant. With the  
exception of Belgium, probably no mem-

ber of the Entente Allies has placed as  
small rifle contracts here. So small have  
these French rifle contracts been that  
heads of some arms corporations are not  
aware that any such contracts were  
placed in this country.

Two small French rifle contracts were  
placed with the Remington Arms Mc-  
tallie Cartridge Company early in the  
war. The first of these was completed.  
Deliveries on the second ceased five  
months ago, and had been cancelled some  
months before, as the contract contained  
a clause that the order might be revoked  
on notice covering a period of time. This  
contract was not sufficiently large to  
make its cancellation a matter of conse-  
quence in the operations of the Rem-  
ington Company, with its enormous or-  
ders for British and Russian rifles, brass  
shell cases and ammunition. Contracts  
placed here by the French government  
for ammunition have not been cancelled,  
and there is no intimation that cancella-  
tions are in prospect for the immediate  
future.
