RECRUITING AND NEWS OF LOCAL SOLDIERS

The total number of recruits secured in New Brunswick during the last week was 147. The total for the preceding week was 119. The county totals for last week follow: St. John, sixty-six; York, thirty-one; Northumberland, twelve; Charlotte, nine; Queens, nine; Sunbury, six; Restigouche, four; Albert, two; Kings, one, and three came from Nova Scotia for the 16th battalion.

Two recruits were secured yesterday afternoon at the recruiting office here—Thos. Belliveau and Charles McCafferty of Richibucto.

Casualties

The names of three New Brunswick men appear in the midnight casualty list: Wounded, missing since June 8, Robert W. Tardy, Newcastle; previously reported missing, now officially died of wounds whilst a prisoner of war, Corporal David H. Still, Chatham; wounded, Harold W. Dickson, Chatham.

Captain the Rev. F. S. Porter, writing from Caesar's Camp, Shorncliffe, on July 28, says of Lance Corporal Elmer A. Belding:

"He came over here from his convalescent quarters last Friday afternoon and I happened to spy him in front of my tent. He knew me before I recognized him. The lad has gone through a nasty ordeal, and it has told upon him, which is of course to be expected. He however, looks very much like himself, clear-eyed, fresh and animated. There may be a little shrapnel in him, but it does not count against his good condition. He related to me some of his experiences in that deadly Ypres salient, and though his reticence prevented his divulging the full personal record, I could detect enough data upon which to claim for him at least the military cross.

"Before the great battle by several weeks he had been instrumental in doing a noble and heroic service for his poor unfortunate chum, McDermott. Amid the hail of bullets and in imminent exposure he had protected the body of his comrade, and when both had gazed his eyes, Elmer secured relics for the parents of the boy and mailed them for their information and comfort. Later, when the desperate battle began on June 2 and the old 6th C. M. R. was cut to pieces, he stood his ground till he could stand no longer. He had previously been buried in a trench and was through all manner of nerve-racking experiences, but it occasioned no faltering or weakening when the critical hour came. He stood game till his signal station and all communications were destroyed. To such as I can only reverently doff my cap. Elmer was over on Monday and tells me he has temporary work in connection with accounts and books, where he is stationed. It will be an agreeable job for awhile and will in no way interfere with his rapid convalescence."

RE-ESTABLISHMENT OF RED CROSS IN GERMANY
NOW UP TO KAISER.
Washington, Aug. 14.—Permission to re-establish American Red Cross units in Germany is being sought of the German government. Announcement at Red Cross headquarters here today said the step as taken in order to make possible the sending of Red Cross supplies to the central power which the British government announced it is willing to allow on condition that the units be re-established, that supplies be sent directly to them, and the state department guarantees that all such supplies be destroyed after their use for hospital purposes, in order to prevent the use of cotton, rubber, etc., for military purposes.

Last October American Red Cross units were withdrawn from Germany as well as other countries in order not to conflict with local agencies. A long and tangled correspondence has ensued, which has finally resulted in British concessions.

NEW BRUNSWICK OFFICERS TO POSTS IN BRITISH ARMY

Of the 300 subalterns Canada has been called upon to furnish for the Imperial forces, eighteen are to go from New Brunswick and several from St. John.

Lieut.-Col. P. A. Guthrie, as officer commanding troops in New Brunswick, was directed on Saturday to furnish the names of eighteen men who had obtained lieutenants' commissions but had failed to get overseas appointments. Up to noon yesterday he had recommended Lieut. R. N. Gilmour, Lieut. Rupert L. Perry and Lieut. D. Roy Murdoch, all of whom upon failing to get attached to an overseas unit as lieutenants enlisted with the 28th Battalion—the New Brunswick Kitties—as sergeants.

Others whose names have been sent forward to Halifax by Colonel Guthrie include Lieut. C. C. Longstrech of Hampton, who was with the 104th Battalion as a supernumerary and is now at Valcartier taking an engineering course; Lieut. Hardy Ganoing, of St. Stephen, who was also with the 104th Battalion and is now at Aldershot taking a machine gun course; Lieut. Elmer McLaughlin, of St. George; Lieut. Gerald A. Hubbard, Lieut. D. Leon Thurott, Lieut. John C. McPherson, Lieut. John T. Gibson and Lieut. Albert E. McElveney, of Fredericton.

Lieut. John T. Gibson, who has been recommended with the other officers, has also been placed in line for the position as officer commanding a cyclist company.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT QUERIED AS TO CASE OF OF MAN WHO SUICIDED

Washington, Aug. 14.—Inquiries have been addressed to the British government through the American embassy in London as to the case of Frank B. Doring, who had been imprisoned at Liverpool by the British and recently committed suicide in Boston.

Doring was arrested in Liverpool on suspicion of being a spy, and, though released shortly afterward, his suicide upon his return to Boston was said to have been caused by a fear that he was being persecuted by English agents. Congressman Olney brought the case to the notice of the state department.

CAR LEAPS CLIFF, TURNS OVER AND OVER; NONE HURT

Picture in your mind's eye just what sensation would come over you were your automobile containing yourself and four friends to dash over a cliff and fly through the air, turning over five times en route and landing right side up with not a member of the party injured and with but a broken wheel on the car to show that you had enjoyed such an experience.

It was not in the movies. It was a real accident. It happened out in the State of Washington. P. A. Tupper, president of the National Bank of Brewster, was the car owner. He was accompanied on a drive by E. A. Woods, J. G. Smith, S. I. Colter and S. J. Stoneham.

The car was being driven round a hair-pin turn, in the dark and just at the critical point the lights went out. Before the car could be stopped it started over the bluff.

Three men jumped at the first stage of danger. When it turned over once, another fell away from it and Mr. Tupper was held back of the steering wheel until the car had gone over three times. Then he flew out and the car turned over twice again and landed right side up.

When stock was taken of the fortunate party it was found that not a bone had been broken, not a man was badly scratched and the right front wheel of the car was broken.

A SIGN OF THE TIMES

In all the German papers there appears an appeal, evidently of official origin, to the German people, which indicates the seriousness with which the German government regards the present situation. The German nation is told, with that Gothic rhetoric which is the consecrated German style, that the battle now exceeds all imagining and that now the hour has struck for the Germans to show what they are worth. Confidence that the army will do its utmost is absolute, but "if our people at home the people it was at the beginning of the war." The appeal goes on to say that every pessimistic thought is treason, that every word of complaint or discouragement is a crime. This document makes a rather striking contrast with the German war bulletins, for, while these profess to minimize the achievements of the Allied offensive, the appeal reveals clearly and unmistakably serious anxiety. But perhaps even more significant than the light thrown on the state of mind of the government is the light thrown upon the state of mind of the people. There must be many German civilians who are losing hope and whom the diet of military glory is no longer satisfying. If the government thinks it necessary to rebuke them openly and endeavor to stir their spirit, there is no need to exaggerate. The major part of the Allied military problem is still to solve, and the German government can still secure from the mass of the people response to its heavy demands. The breaking point has not yet been reached, but the strain is being felt, and by so much the return to reason is nearer. That is a fact which must be noted.

WINS MILITARY CROSS

The king has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross, in recognition of gallantry and devotion to duty in the field, upon 2nd Lieut. John Gwynne Howell, R.F.A. (attached to No. 16 Squadron, 2nd Wing, Royal Flying Corps).

The act for which Lieut. Howell was awarded the cross was as follows: On May 4 in France, Captain T., the pilot of the machine, was killed by anti-aircraft fire. His observer, Lieut. Howell, managed to climb back into the pilot's seat while the machine was falling and succeeded in bringing it safely back into the British lines.

Lieut. Howell, previous to the war was for several years with Messrs. Lukis, Stewart & Company, Ltd., of Montreal. On the outbreak of the war, he unsuccessfully attempted to enlist in the artillery. He then crossed to England, where he at once received a commission in the R. F. A. After he had been at the front for some time with the artillery, he was transferred, as observer, to the Royal Flying Corps.
