pet of Fairville and Company Sergeant
Major Adams of Hampton

Carleton Soldier Wounded in Battle of
Ypres

Frederick H. Lodge, 14th battalion, son of Frank Lodge, foreman with the Maritime Dredging & Construction Company, West St. John, is another local man who takes a place on the roll of honor among the wounded in the battle of Ypres. A message received from Ottawa announces that he has been wounded. It is hoped by his many friends that it is not serious. Before leaving for the front, he was a member of the Carleton Cornet Band.

George H. Tippett of Fairville received word from Ottawa on Sunday morning that Private S. B. Tippett, better known as "Bud", was seriously ill in a hospital in Cardiff. As he was on the firing line at Easter time it is believed his illness was contracted at the front.

Letters received from "Bud" from time to time and published in part, have always been eagerly read. He was one of the most popular young men in this section. Born and brought up in Fairville, his school life is well remembered by many today and his escapades and jovial disposition alike made him many staunch friends among the companions of his youth. At St. Joseph's College he played on the baseball team and developed some reputation as a pitcher. It is sincerely hoped that the illness may not prove so serious as the telegram would

DOCK STREET CASE IS TAKEN UP IN COURT

Xenos Tells of Attack Made Upon Him—Hit With a Hammer

James Kelly, William Petley and Robert Walker were arraigned for preliminary hearing in the police court this morning on a charge of assaulting James M. Xenos, a young Greek, employed by George Martin, Dock street, and doing him bodily injury.

The plaintiff testified that he was at work on Saturday afternoon repairing shoes when the three defendants entered. Petley asked him, "Then George was coming back, meaning Mr. Martin, and he told them he did not know. The three men, he said, then walked to one end of the store and began to speak in an undertone. Petley, he says, then approached and picked up a hammer, used an obscene expression and said, "Hit it, you." The witness said that as he looked up he was struck on the head with the hammer. The cut began to bleed freely and he rushed for the door to get a policeman. As he did so, he said, the other two men seized him and they him down while Petley again tried to strike him with the hammer. He managed to get outside the door and he hid for a half hour waiting for the police to come. While he was hiding, he said, Petley got out another door and escaped. The police arrived a few minutes later and arrested Kelly and Walker.

To Petley, the witness said he had a hammer in his hand when the three entered and put it down and picked up his knife to cut the leather. He denied having threatened to stick the knife in the defendant.

Joseph Xenopoulos, another young Greek, said he was working in a barber shop across the street. He sought for about a half hour for a policeman, but failed to find one.

The prisoners were then remanded. Samuel Rayner, arrested on Saturday night on a drunkenness charge and also for using abusive language to policeman Ross, was fined 16 or four months in jail in the police court this morning. The policeman testified that he saw the man staggering along the street and advised him to go home. He used profane and abusive language and he took him in charge.

George Terrault was fined \$40 or six months in jail for drunkenness and for interfering with the police. Policeman Dale testified against him.

One man arrested on a drunkenness charge was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

RAINFALL PLAYS MISCHIEF HERE

Five Hour Trip Over Two Miles of Roadway—Same Troubles in the City

The continued rainfall is having a serious effect upon the roads in the vicinity of the city, and through the country districts generally, as they are being quite badly broken up and softened, and also through the frost coming through. A local resident returning to the city last night with his horse and carriage, was for five hours struggling over two miles of roadway. Automobile owners say that the protracted rain is making the roads very dangerous for machines.

About the city there are several concrete cellars in business houses where so-called water has caused the necessity of special attention to keep away the water. The cellars have been built below the sewerage level, much dampness has come through from the heavy rains, and extra caution has been required to keep the furnace area going. It has been noticeable also, in connection with ordinary delivery about town, that boxes have been improvised by grocers, butchers, etc., and to prevent leakage from the bottom of the wagons, layers of sawdust have been spread over the bottoms, thus protecting the articles in transit.

WM. PHINNEY LEFT NO WILL

Estate Totals \$10,900—Matter of Jennie H. Bell Estate

The probate court today took up the matter of the estate of William O. Phinney, liquor dealer. He died intestate and without children. He left his wife, Annie L. Phinney, three brothers, Howard W., retail liquor dealer; George D., waiter, and Thomas J. Phinney, of Des Moines, Iowa, grammarian instructor, and one sister, Catherine, wife of Martin Duffy, of St. John. On the petition of all of these, Martin McGuire of St. John, liquor merchant, was appointed administrator. Real estate is \$7,800, subject to a mortgage for \$5,000, personally \$3,800. John A. Barry is executor.

The court also took up the matter of the estate of Jennie H. Bell, late of Boston, who died in 1914 in Provincetown, Mass. At the time of her death she held part of a mortgage on property in St. Martins given by Roy W. Bell to the late Minnie A. Thayer. Administration was obtained on the estate of the deceased in Boston and the mortgage being paid off, the Boston administrator, and the other mortgage, cancelled the mortgage. This being insufficient, on the petition of Effie Bell of St. Martins and Mary McWhinney, wife of William McWhinney of the same place, sisters of the deceased, J. Roy Campbell of St. John, barrister-at-law, was appointed administrator for the purpose of properly cancelling the mortgage. J. Roy Campbell, K. C., is executor.
