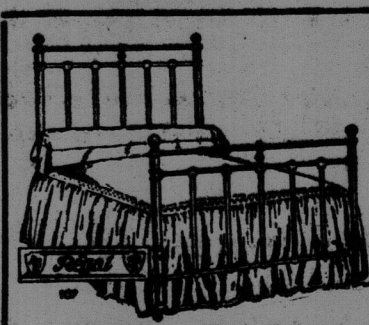

LAYS A HEAVY  
HAND ON BRYAN

Bangor Commercial Scores Late Secre-  
tary For Leaving Post At  
Time of Crisis

(Bangor Commercial)  
The retirement of William Jennings  
Bryan from the office secretary of the  
state, which comes coincidentally with  
the crucial moment in the relations be-  
tween this country and Germany will

be received with grave surprise by the  
American people.

At a time when men of both great  
parties and people of all beliefs are  
standing solidly in support of President  
Wilson, upholding his hands and giving  
to the world the most remarkable ex-  
hibition of unanimity that history has  
presented, Mr. Bryan places his personal  
views above the opinion of the great  
majority, not only of his fellow cabinet  
members but of the citizens of the  
United States, and leaves his post.

Mr. Bryan has occupied the chair of  
the secretary of state for more than two  
years. He has never, we believe, held a  
place in the administration comparable  
with his high title. His principal en-  
deavors have, as throughout his public  
career, been largely confined to the ad-  
vancement of his favorite "isms," chief  
among which has been pacifism. He  
has negotiated peacefully, and always  
with the advice and consent of President  
Wilson, some thirty treaties with as  
many nations looking towards peace in  
the spare moments he has turned an  
hour's penury by using his high office to  
draw crowds to the lecture hall to hear  
him preach upon his favorite subject.

Now, instead of showing loyalty to his  
chief, the president, in the present crisis  
and by another for the moment his  
own personal desires as to the methods  
to be pursued, Mr. Bryan, believing  
that he sees danger ahead, quits, un-  
willing to sacrifice anything of that  
which he holds precious and valuable to  
himself.

The country will be quick to grasp  
the difference in calibre between Presi-  
dent Wilson and Mr. Bryan. President  
Wilson's views on peace are well  
known. The thirty treaties placed to the  
credit of Mr. Bryan, would never have  
been drawn and signed but for the ac-  
quiescence and assistance of the presi-  
dent. We suspect that the note to Ger-  
many following the Lusitania massacre,  
was written by Mr. Wilson only after  
he had steered himself to the task. It  
is not that he is not ready to follow  
to follow it with another equally strong,  
proven, not only to the American people,  
but to the people of the whole world  
that he is a man who will never hesitate  
from personal motives to follow abso-  
lutely and to the end the course that  
he believes to be right and which he  
knows in his heart to be the only course  
that the United States can hold com-  
patible with its dignity and self-respect.

Whether Mr. Bryan is big enough to  
realize this, we do not know but that he  
is not big enough even to follow in the  
lead of a greater mind were fear for his  
personal future stands across the path  
of the latest and most spectacular action.  
Politics, personal beliefs, personal ambi-  
tions and thoughts of self have no place  
in the mind of a public servant at a  
time like this.

That the nobility of President Wil-  
son's example should be lost upon Mr.  
Bryan is not strange. Mr. Bryan's entire  
political career has been one of self  
only, and that is the personal ad-  
vancement of William Jennings Bryan.  
If Mr. Bryan had waited for the out-  
come of this present precarious stage in  
our foreign relations and then had re-  
signed he would have been easily  
forgotten. His withdrawal from office now  
embarrassing as it does the administra-

tion at a juncture which may well be  
fatal to the nation, is so essentially  
disloyal, both to the administration of  
which he was a part and to the country  
which he should have served to the last  
titch of his ability, will never be for-  
gotten or forgiven.

RIVALLED BALACLAVA  
The following letter signed "A Gun-  
ner" and dated from the Red Cross Hos-  
pital, Harlow, Essex, May 19th, appears  
in the London Morning Post: "The fol-  
lowing is an extract from your report of  
Lord Kitchener's statement in the  
House of Lords:

"The Canadians, however, were soon  
supported by British brigades pushed  
up, and the enemy's advance was there-  
by checked."

I want to tell you that the pushing up  
of those British brigades was one of the  
most glorious episodes of the war. They  
went up in broad daylight, in skirmish-  
ing order, in face of the most awful  
shell fire. It seemed impossible that any  
of them would reach the trenches. Their  
exploit will bear comparison with Bal-  
aclava and I hope the day will come  
when a more able pen than mine will  
tell the world of the heroism of our  
incomparable infantry in front of  
Ypres. I am thankful for the privilege  
of having been a witness of their hero-  
ism and offer them my undying admira-  
tion."

LEAVES NEARLY WHOLE  
OF ESTATE TO CHARITY

Portland, Me., June 12.—The will of  
John K. Martin, for many years a hotel  
keeper in this city, contains bequests to  
local charities amounting to practically  
the whole of his estate, which is es-  
timated to be worth more than \$800,000.  
A local judge is made trustee of the  
estate with instructions to pay the in-  
come to his wife until her death, when  
the property will be divided as follows:  
St. Elizabeth's Orphan Asylum, \$75,000;  
Maine Home for Friendless Boys, \$75,  
000; Maine General Hospital and Maine  
Eye and Ear Infirmary, each \$50,000;  
Female Orphan Asylum, residue of es-  
tate. In each case only the income of  
the fund can be used.

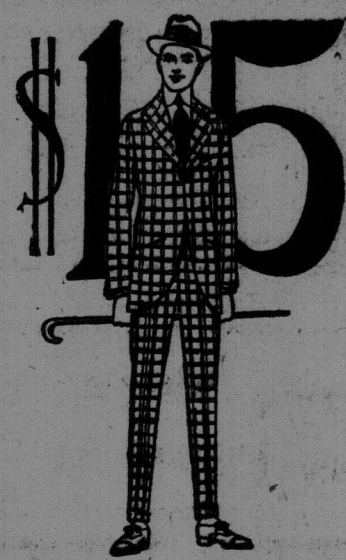
