FIGURES FROM AUDIT

The report of the auditor, A. E. Cox, covered the period from June 1925 to April 30, 1926. This showed stock sales of \$1,814,100, of which \$1,024,218.78 had been paid up and \$789,881.22 was still outstanding. The direct sales of stock and commission amounted to \$23,562,922, which was 17.46 per cent of the total sales of \$1,350,000,000. The total sales of stock and commission amounted to \$11,284,844, bringing the total expenses paid to \$84,847.76.

COMING FROM ENGLAND.

Mr. Burpee asked about subscriptions which were supposed to come from England and Mr. Porter said the company had advice from Capt. Starley that two capitalists were sailing for England next month to look into the project with an idea of investing. He complained that the company had been hindered by H. Arkell, Dominion Live Stock Inspector and Harvey Mitchell, deputy minister of agriculture for the province, but said he had done all they could to aid the project. Mr. Hughes asked that an adjournment be made until the company had filed a statement showing the amount of stock sold since April 30 and amount of money received.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

The chairman said the board would like to have a record of the amount of "high pressure" salesmen who had been operating since April 30, and he would allow the counsel for the company an opportunity to consult the clients. If this information could be given at once the board would deal with the application to restore the certificate, but if it was not available an adjournment would be made. After consultation Mr. Porter informed the board that the original agreement with C. Balsam James, New York, the company handling the sales campaign, could not be found, but it provided for a commission of 18 per cent and a bonus of an additional 10 per cent. If \$100,000 was sold in 1926, there was also one salesman operating on a 10 per cent commission. He understood from a casual remark of Mr. McIntyre's that \$96,000 had been sold by the James organization and he still had a few days of the 30 left. Mr. Hughes charged that some of the salesmen employed by the James concern had come in under false statements to the immigration officials. The statement, he said, was most unsatisfactory to him and he would like an adjournment. The company, he said, was said to have \$300,000 of stock and they had in the bank \$36,000. Where was the \$42,000? Mr. Porter said Mr. Hughes was unfair and was not stating all the case. The board often went into private session to consider the matter.
