

### Two Tots Being Reared by Minnesota U Girls New Educational Phase

New York, June 28.—Not all learning comes from books, so American college students believe. Hence the unique method of spending the summer vacation which the group here has adopted.

Under the leadership of Colonel Arthur F. Cosby of New York, this group of seven girls and one man are off to Labrador, where they will do missionary work until next September.

The photograph shows Miss Logan of Chicago, Miss Paret of Yassan, Miss Goodnow of New York, Miss Wendell of Chicago, Miss Garrett of New York, Miss Card of Chicago, and Miss Smith of New York. The men are Colonel Cosby of New York and Mr. Purves of Philadelphia.

The young people will teach in missionary schools and conduct physical training exercises among the Eskimos, introducing modern American educational methods into the frozen North.

A unique scheme for acquiring learning at first hand is that undertaken by the co-eds at the University of Minnesota, who have "adopted" two children to rear along modern, scientific lines.

Anna on the left, who has spent two of her three years at the university, is a "sophomore," and Billy, on the right, is only a freshman, having arrived at the University last April.

Both children are orphans. They will be brought up in a highly educational atmosphere, and it is thought their upbringing will teach practical motherhood to the girls of Minnesota "U" better than a purely theoretical course would.

NOTED ART DEALER PAYS DEARLY FOR ENTHUSIASM

London Furniture Expert Gave \$200,000 for Commode That Finally Brought \$80.

London, June 10.—(By mail)—Every great art dealer will confess that at some time or other when "his eye was not in" he blundered, and had to pay dearly for his mistake, comments The London Daily Telegraph. The late Charles Worthelmer was unquestionably a keen judge of old furniture, and one day, seeing a commode and a table in an old French chateau he felt sure that they were by the famous chemist, Jean Henri Riesener, and gave \$200,000 for the pair. Almost immediately after the purchase he knew that he had both deceived himself and had been deceived. In the sale after his death, 1912, the commode sold for \$80 and the table for \$125.

A reminder of another error came at Christie's yesterday, when a portrait was sold of a young girl. It had often been ascribed to Titian, and exhibited as such at Manchester and Burlington House. In the Baxter sale, 1881, it was bought for the late John Edward Taylor for only \$35, but at the Taylor sale in 1912, in a burst of Titian confidence, it realized as much as \$900. Five years later it dropped to \$19 and yesterday the really charming picture of a young girl (said to be Titian's daughter), seated in a chair, making lace, brought \$34.
