### NO BEER IN ARSENAL

It is reported from England, through British newspapers, that there is to be no more beer in Woolwich Arsenal. Up to now the manual workers in the arsenal have been allowed to send out for beer during their dinner hour. Now a notice has been posted up announcing that no alcoholic liquor is to be brought into the factories. The notice concludes: "In cases where the work is necessarily of a hot nature, such as forges, furnaces, etc., barley water will be provided."

### COLLEGE HEADS ARE DRY.

The Intercollegiate Prohibition Association of Chicago recently received replies from a questionnaire it sent out to presidents of universities and colleges as to their personal stand on Prohibition and the views of their faculties and students. Of the 158 replies received 136 were wholly favorable to the dry era. A few were distinctly favorable, but not wholly so, and only a small minority expressed doubt as to the wisdom of Prohibition or were non-committal.

### BRITISH COAL IS SENT TO AMERICA

Brisk Business Expected at New York if U. S. Strike Continues.

New York, July 14.—Because of the congestion and shortage of motive power due to the railroad strike and the observance of the fourth of July by the miners, the output of bituminous coal fell off from 1,000,000 to 1,500,000 tons during the last week, it was estimated in coal trade circles here. As a result it was stated prices again moved upward, despite Secretary of Commerce Hoover's figure of \$3.50 a ton, going as high as \$3.25 in some non-union districts.

A feature of the week was the arrival of the first cargo of British coal in New York harbor since the national miners' strike. This coal was being offered from \$6.20 to \$7.75 a ton, as compared with the range of \$7.75 to \$7.50 on American fuel at the pier.

"A brisk business in English coal seems likely if the strike continues," said the market report of the Coal Trade Journal. "The comparatively small quantities offered the local coal trade last week were readily absorbed."

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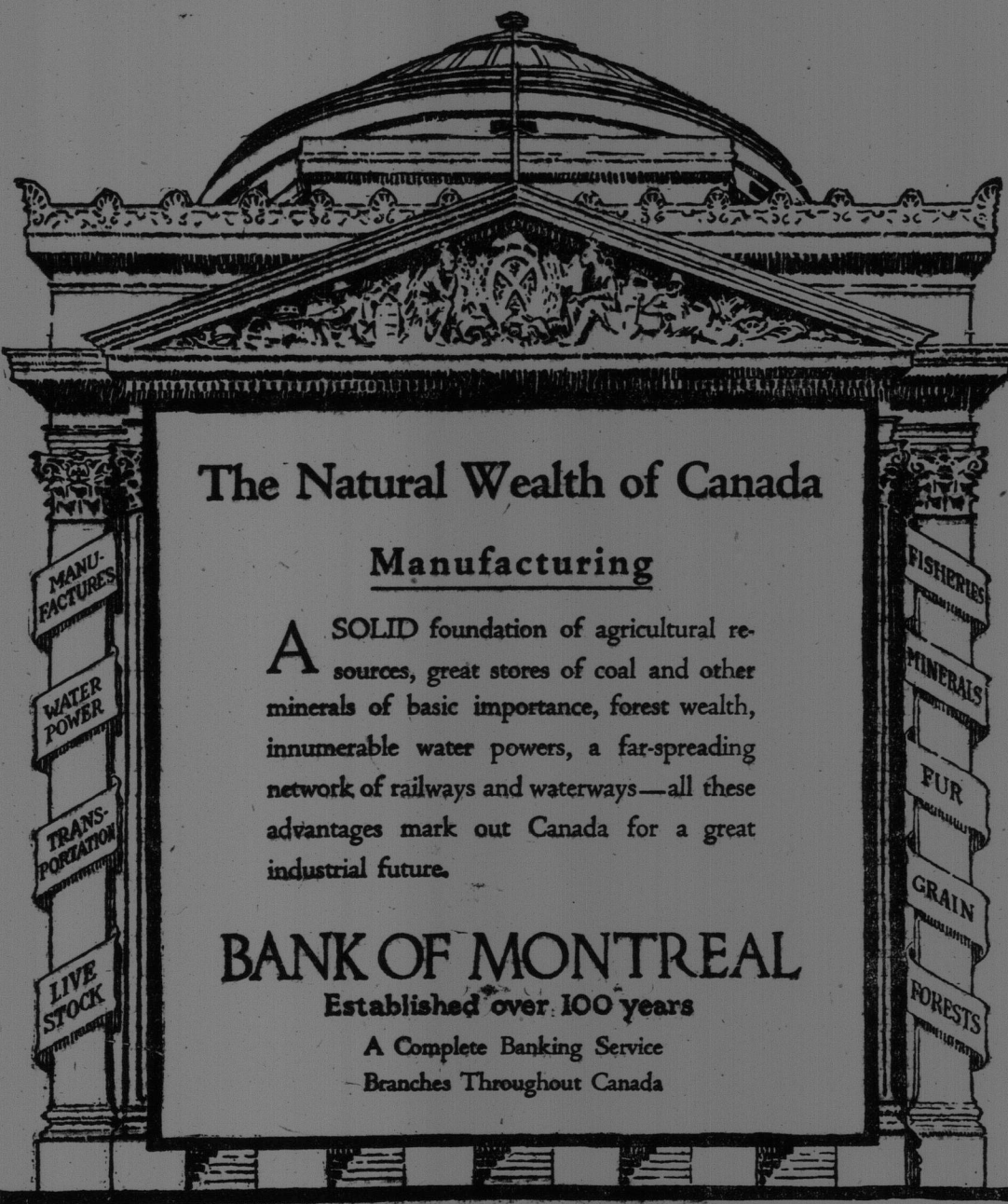

100 per cent, and about 20,000 to 25,000 tons are being dredged weekly out of the rivers.

### ACADIA SUGAR.

(Montreal Gazette)

On the 26th of this month the annual meeting of the Acadia Sugar Refining Company, Limited, will be held and at that time plans will be considered for an internal reorganization which will have for a primary requisite the rearrangement of capital obligations. It is the intention to sell to shareholders second mortgage bonds to the extent of \$1,000,000.

This company, in common with all refiners, is now beginning to find a greatly improved outlook, with their refineries working to capacity and a demand quite in keeping with their output. These facts, coupled with the advance in prices of late to a scale in keeping with high cost of raws, should find reflection in earnings of the sugar refiners, who all feel, however, that they still have a long row to hoe following their strenuous experiences in 1920 and the period of rehabilitation of 1921.

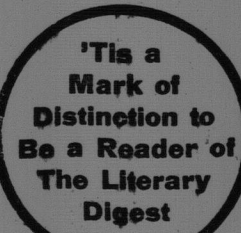
