In a recent letter home, Arthur N. Carter, writing from the training camp in England of the King Edward Horse, to which he and other Canadian Rhodes' scholars are attached, speaks of the impatience of the collegians to get to the front and do something. This, he said, was the characteristic attitude of all who enlisted. Many of the Oxford men, he said, had accepted commissions, but that would entail a longer sojourn in England, and perhaps continuous drilling of recruits. Messrs. Reid and Dyde, Rhodes' men from Nova Scotia and Alberta, were going to remain as well as himself in the K. E. H. and get some experience at the front. Curiously enough both Reid and Dyde, though representing other provinces at Oxford, are New Brunswickers, the former hailing from Carleton County, and Dyde is a son of Doctor Dyde, once a well known professor at the University of New Brunswick.
