FIVE BOYS ARRESTED IN STEALING CASE; THERE MAY BE MORE

Five boys, all under sixteen, were arrested last night, charged with breaking and entering Benjamin Dean's store at the corner of Mill street and Paradise row and stealing several packages of cigarettes, chocolate bars and canned goods. An entrance was made through a window at the back of the shop. The putty was removed, and a pane of glass taken out. The boys were arrested by Sergeant Kilpatrick and Policeman Briggs. It is said that more boys were implicated and other arrests will probably be made.

GETTING ON WELL WITH THE NEW HOSPITAL

Remarkably good headway is being made in the construction of the new St. John County Hospital for tubercular patients at Little River. The outside walls are now complete and the roof is being placed on the main building. This will completely cover in the whole structure, the roofs on the wings having been completed last week. The main building is of three storeys while the wings are of two storeys each. A large chimney at the rear of the building, leading from the furnace room is erected as far as the capping, which is now being placed in position. The work on the interior of the hospital will commence immediately and can be pursued without interference on account of weather conditions.

More Letters of Interest Come From Our Soldiers

In a recent letter home, Arthur N. Carter, writing from the training camp in England of the King Edward Horse, which British and Canadian Rhodes scholars are attached, speaks of the impatience of the collegians to get to the front and do something. This, he said, was the characteristic attitude of all who enlisted. Many of the Oxford men, he said, had accepted commissions, but that would entail a longer sojourn in England, and perhaps continuous drilling of recruits. Messrs. Reid and Dyde, Rhodes men from Nova Scotia and Alberta, were going to remain as well as himself in the King E. H. and get some experience in the front. Curiously enough both Reid and Dyde, though representing other provinces at Oxford, are from Carleton County, and Dyde is a son of Doctor Dyde, once a well known professor at the University of New Brunswick.

Commenting upon the delay in getting to the front, Mr. Carter said every one had implicit confidence in the minister of war, Kitchener, and their personal feelings must give way to his plan of campaign, but there was an impression that while the German fleet avoided a fight, England would not be left without plenty of troops to repel a possible raid upon the coast. At the present time with the lines of communication comparatively short in Belgium and France, there was not the same necessity for mounted infantry and cavalry that there would be later. While no one in England apparently had any doubt of the result of the war, and the victory of the allies, still the idea that the conflict would be brief was never put forward now.

MORE VOTERS NOW ON LIST

Revisors' Work Makes Increase of 243 This Year
The revision of the list of voters for the year has been completed and will be presented to the common council this afternoon. There are now on the lists 12,680 voters within the city limits. This compares favorably with last year's figures of 12,437, making an increase of 243. For a number of other cities are standing still, this must be regarded as eminently satisfactory, for it represents, on the ordinary basis for such estimates, an increase of about 1,000 in the city population.
