**NOTED FRENCH POET DYING OF HUNGER**

Distinguished Scientist, Friend of Victor Hugo and Darwin

New York, July 25—According to despatches published here today, Henri Fabre, a noted French poet and scientist, whom Victor Hugo described as "the insects' poet," is dying of hunger in Provence, neglected and well forgotten by his beloved France. Fabre is 85 years old. He had been nearly sightless for some time, it is said.

Darwin called Fabre "one of the greatest of the world's chosen men."

The Frenchman devoted his life to the study of insects and their habits, but he was not a scientist alone, for he had the soul of a poet. He spent weeks, months and years in minutely observing the habits of insects. The results of these observations he combined, not in mere text books, but in prose of majestic simplicity, which reads like a poem of nature. It has been observed that "it was Fabre who rendered possible such works as Master Inck's 'Life of the Bee' and Rostand's 'Chantier.'" Where others dissected he observed and learned the secrets of the insects.

**CHATHAM'S SUGGESTIONS FOR BOARD OF TRADE**

Chatham, N. B., July 25—At a lengthy and animated meeting of the Board of Trade last evening three subjects were decided upon, for submission to the Maritime Board at its annual meeting. Two of those were in regard to urging upon the local legislature the advisability of giving bonuses to the farmers, one for the raising of beef cattle which dressed up to 500 pounds within an age limit of five years. The third was a bonus for farmers producing a certain quantity of butter grading up to a specified standard. A third measure was the suggestion that the Maritime Board should endeavor to arrange with each local board of trade in the various towns of the province for the appointment of a responsible collector of accounts in each town so that greater security could be given merchants in trading with all parts of the province.

**JAPAN'S GREAT RULER**

(Montreal Witness)

After years of confusion and civil war the shogunate in Japan was forced to abdicate, and in 1888 the Mikado's authority was established and was recognized by the powers.

Mituhiko had ascended to the throne the year before, at the age of sixteen. Instead of being used as a sort of sanctity for the acts of despots, as his ancestors had been, he found himself under the tutelage of a committee of progress, a body of some fifty-five remarkable men, who instructed him in western ways. He was pledged on oath to establish representative government, to abandon worthless traditions, to make ability and not birth the path of promotion, and to seek throughout the world for men of talent to assist in the work of transforming Japan. Then a very wonderful thing followed. The Daimos or landed nobles, who had been so terrible, each in his territory, that no man dared look upon him as they passed, but must bow his face on the ground, with one accord laid their hands and their vessels and their revenues at the Mikado's feet, accepting pension: They had in some way come to realize that the safety of their country required this sacrifice, and resolved that the old era would pass away in high honor. Indeed, from the date of the accession of Mituhiko, the history of Japan has been one continuous transformation scene of brilliant success. The country was falter ground for the seeds of all cultures. From being a severed people, living in fairy fancies, it has come forth not only one of the most robust, but one of the most advanced of nations, with an educational system that casts our own far into the shade. What part the monarch has taken in all this the world does not know, except that he has been loyal to it, and that he loyalty and sanction have been the chief factor in it. It could not have taken place without divine conditions had he been opposed to it. To the Japanese, whether daimio or coolie, it was enough that the Mikado willed it. To the warrior it was enough that he was fighting for the Mikado, and that the Mikado would care for his family if he was killed. It would be hard to find in history a more remarkable reign.
