HEARING OF PRIVILEGES GRANTED THE GRAND TRUNK.

Arguments before United States and Treasury officials for and against a change in the system of bonded goods in the Eastern States were heard yesterday by Judge Day, representing the hearing at the treasury department to-day on the general question of the privileges granted the Grand Trunk railroad in the transportation of bonded goods through American territory, arguments were made by ex-convict Long of Michigan and Mr. E. B. Conger against a continuance of the existing system, and by Judge Day, representing the Grand Trunk road, and Mr. A. C. Raymond of Detroit and others in opposition to any change in the system. Messrs. Conger asked for such a change in the present system as to be retained until direct American supervision of foreign territory to be loaded, bonded, sealed and unsealed within foreign territory.
