THE IRISH LAND QUESTION.

The proposal of the British Government respecting the Irish land question has been hailed by a considerable portion

of the press with unstinted praise, and in some cases with enthusiasm.

On examining the proposed measure, however, we must confess that we fail to see how, if adopted, it will afford the slightest relief to the industrial classes.

The curse of Ireland, and, indeed, the curse of the rest of the world, is that one set of people can say to the others, "You must do the work and we will enjoy the profits." Hence the duke has received—luxury without caring whether the peasant has sold like a slave only to see his earnings go to support the luxuries of the palace.

Essentially this is slavery—one man living by the sweat of another man's face. The new measure proposes to secure to the landlord just as fully as ever his life of extravagant leisure. He will receive his unearned, extorted income in its excessive abundance even more certainly and punctually than before. It is the same old story, and irrespective of the honesty of the landlord right might not be built upon it. (Cheers.) Such a view seemed to him to be perfectly equitable. Why should value be given to the owners' property by the enterprise and industry of the community and by the means of bringing the workers to their senses and show them how they have been allowing a few corporations to usurp their rights. When people invoke the law on every slight pretext it has a tendency to bring the law into disrepute.

We do not find the courts granting injunctions to restrain corporations and employers from acting unfairly to their employees. But, now, if a man union speaks to a fellow-laborer with a view of getting into their ranks so that he cannot be used as a club to keep union men from earning fair wages, the employer invokes the aid of the law and an injunction against the organization. On the other hand, if a man is interested in the organization of the laborers, he will be ultimately compelled to fight it should come to nothing to that purpose.
