LOCAL NEWS

Mr. Ritchie, the Y. M. C. A. boys' secretary for Canada, was a guest of the local Y. M. C. A. last night. He will stay in St. John today and take the Montreal train this evening for Ottawa Y. M. C. A. boys' camp.

The president and members of the Rothery Boat Club have issued invitations to their friends to attend informal aquatic sports and afterwards a dance at their boat house this evening.

The hearing before J. N. W. Winslow, commissioner appointed by the provincial government with reference to the expropriation proceedings at Grand Falls, has been postponed until August 10th, in order that expert evidence may be obtained. Mr. P. R. Taylor appeared for the Grand Falls Water Power and Boom Co., and Barnhill, Ewing and Sanford and H. A. Powell for the Grand Falls Power Co.

A petition which has been circulated among the medical men of the city asking for a change in existing rules at the General Public Hospital, has been sent to the hospital commission, but as yet no reply has been received. Under the regulations of the institution all patients must be attended by doctors attached to the staff. None of the city medical men have the right to go to the institution to treat a patient of theirs who may go into the hospital, and the petition asks that the privilege be granted in regard to patients in private rooms. Some time ago the St. John Medical Society passed a resolution favoring such a change in the rules of the hospital.

WEATHER KEPT PEOPLE GUESSING THIS MORNING

Many Preparations for a Lively Out-Door Holiday But Dampness Threatened Disaster.

The enjoyment of the third half-holiday of the season will be marred considerably by the uncertainty of the weather. Numerous attractions have been planned, but during the morning it was feared that most of the outdoor events would have to be postponed. The city was enveloped in a heavy fog early this morning and at times rain fell in showers. The sun came out about 10.30 o'clock, bringing joy to many eager watchers.

Two base ball matches are scheduled to take place this afternoon. The Marathons and Tartars will cross bats on the Victoria grounds at three o'clock. The St. Josephs and St. Peters will clash on the Shamrock grounds in the third game of the championship series.

The yacht races on the river are attracting much interest. The Royal Kennebec Yacht Club and Westfield Outing Association will hold a number of events.

MOOSEPATH RACES START ON THURSDAY

Prospects for One of the Best Series Ever Seen Here

Many Horses Now at the Park Training—Improvements Made to Track and Everything is Ready.

Moosepath Park has again been transformed into an up-to-date racing park. The grounds of the Driving Club have been the scene of great activity during the past week. A number of horses have been working out, while elaborate improvements were being made to the track and grounds. Everything was completed last evening and the repairs and additions have placed Moosepath in the best condition in which it has ever been.

With practically only four days to St. John's summer meet, the "speedy ones" are arriving for the events in large numbers and great enthusiasm is prevailing among the horsemen. Considerable rivalry is also being shown in the tri-outr.

Lady Kip, 2000, owned by A. E. Trice, of Salisbury, is already at Moosepath, and is working out in splendid fashion.

The trainers are predicting some excellent racing in the free-for-all event and the track record may be broken in any of the races. Simasie, 2084, one of Frank Boutiller's string, is also at the park and is travelling fast. A number are counting on Simasie's duplicating her previous wonderful performances on the provincial race tracks.

When Starter C. J. Dorothy "calls all ready for the horses" at Moosepath next week, he will send away no less than seven fast entries in the free-for-all. There are ten starters in the 215 class.

The fast Fredericton string reached the track yesterday. High O'Neill is again prominent with a fine entry list. Mr. O'Neill has entered Louis E. in the free-for-all; Daisy Wilkes in the 215 and Greyville in the 224. Burthe, 216 1-4, owned by W. B. Kitchen, of Fredericton, is also on the track. J. E. Sullivan has shipped Mona Barren and Warren F. to Moosepath, while King Arion, owned by H. C. Jewett, of Fredericton, is also at the park.

There are at present thirty-three horses on the track. Frank Boutiller of Halifax, and F. Fox of Montreal, Mass., have all their animals at Moosepath. F. Parsons and Mitchell of Halifax, and C. H. Fenwick, of Sussex, and others are working out their entries in anticipation of close contests.

Terrance Queen, 238, and Frank Patch, owned by Thomas Hayes of this city, as well as Fred Duncan's string are going nicely and should give a good account of themselves. Northern Star, owned by the Dufferin Hotel, will also be among the starters. F. Hector, of Lewiston, and L. D. Morton, of Digby, will ship their strings to Moosepath on Monday.

Secretary John Ross is in communication with the large turf centres of the province and Maine, and he expects a record attendance at the meet. Every available space should be taken and only fine weather is needed to make the events the most successful in the history of the province.

A number of the old stalls have been improved and a new barn has been erected at the track. There are eleven splendid box stalls at the track.
