2 ACCIDENTS AT DEBEC

Earle Barnett Severely Injured by Fall—Ernest Campbell Hurt in Sawmill—Funeral of Milton Crawford.

Debec, Sept. 1.—Earle Barnett, the young son of William Barnett of this village met with a very painful accident at Debec on Friday afternoon. He was carrying a large log on his back, and fell, striking his knee so violently that he was unable to walk. He was carried to the hospital, where he was summoned, who found the wound to be a serious nature, being necessary to take six stitches. At the time of writing the little fellow is resting quite comfortably.

Ernest Campbell, who is employed in Murdoch's saw mill at Benton, a few miles below here, sustained quite a serious accident when his hand came in contact with a moving saw. The saw severed one finger and cut several others quite badly. The injured member was sent to the hospital, where the young man went to rest to-day, where a medical doctor dressed the wound.
