BUSINESS-LIKE ADMINISTRATION

How Public Money is Absolutely Safeguarded Through Thorough System of Accounting Employed by Prov. Gov't

Fredericton, Mar. 16.—Occasionally

the provincial secretary in a public

address will refer in a casual way,

to the improved methods of bookkeeping

installed in the several departments

of the administration of the province,

but few, if any, people have any idea

of the very thorough system of ac-

counting for every detail of the ad-

ministration that now prevails, and

the absolute check that is maintained

upon every official who has to do

with receiving or accounting for the

people's money.

Without rehearsing here the loose-

ness and lack of system under the

old administration, a brief descrip-

tion of methods now prevailing will

not be without interest to the people

of the province.

In the Crown Lands.

Take the Crown land department

first, for from that department comes

nearly one-half of the entire revenues

of the province. To any and every per-

son paying money into the department

the deputy surveyor general must give

a receipt, which receipt is counter-

signed by the receiver general. This

receipt, moreover, is in duplicate, and

one copy must be sent to the receiver

general's office.

Every day the Surveyor General

must hand over to the Receiver Gen-

eral all money received, whether it be

\$5 or \$50,000; but the Receiver Gen-

eral will not take such money unless

accompanied by the duplicates of the

receipts which have been given out

during the day. The Receiver Gen-

eral, in turn, gives the Surveyor Gen-

eral a receipt for such money.

Every day the Receiver General

makes a detailed audit of the books

and vouchers of every department,

receiving money, and requires that all

shall be turned over to him before

the day's transactions are closed up.

The books in the Crown Land De-

partment showing the transactions

with the scalars, with firms paying

stampage, with mining and fishing

leases, and every receiving detail are

models of conciseness, accuracy and

information.

The Same in All Departments.

What is true of the Crown Land

Department is also true of the Provin-

cial Secretary's office, of the Provin-

cial Hospital accounting at St. John,

and of every department having any-

thing to do with the finances.

It should be borne in mind in this

connection, that none of these de-

partments pay out one cent of the

provincial money. Everything goes to

the Receiver General.

Hon. Mr. LaBrosse said he was
