The recent rains have assisted the river drives considerably and there are still large masses of logs on the bridge piers which are very difficult to dislodge.


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Andrew D. Foster, an old and respected resident of Mainstream, passed away a few days ago from a sudden stroke of paralysis.

DIG DAY IN ST. STEPHEN

Border Town Getting Ready for Celebration on Dominion Day - Popular St. John Couple Wed.

St. Stephen, June 2.-Energetic committees are perfecting arrangements for a grand celebration of Dominion Day in St. Stephen which it is proposed to hold street sports in the forenoon and some interesting events at the driving park in the afternoon, to include a free-for-all and 220 class horse races, a horse running race and a boat race in which men and horses from the two Milltowns, Calais, and St. Stephen, will participate for generous purses. Bands will follow in attendance all day and there will be something doing all the time. Cheap excursion rates will be secured from railroads and steamboats and a good time will be assured all who visit St. Stephen on July 1.

Gas consumers have been notified that from July 15th the rate for gas for heating and mechanical purposes will be increased from \$1 per thousand to \$1.50 per thousand, an increase of 50 per cent. In view of the fact that consumers have all along been assured that as the consumption increased the rate would be lowered, it may be only coincidence but the announcement follows closely another announcement that the gas company is to replace a section of its old main on Water and King streets with new pipes.

Bredon of the General Film Company, St. John, Maine, was in town Saturday and there have been some consequences, in which the St. John cinema company is to replace an archdeacon have figured conspicuously. Miss Bessie R. Hammond, of St. John, has been the guest for some days of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Robinson, where she had been a frequent visitor on former occasions.

Miss Henderson came originally from Northumberland county, where her father and sister reside, and has lived in St. John for the past twenty years. During this time she has frequently suffered from fits of insanity, when her friends would send her to the Provincial Hospital for treatment. The last of these occurred about three months ago. She was discharged from the hospital, apparently quite sane, and returned to her home on Sea street, which she had purchased some time before. She was the early part of the week when it was noticed that the house was shut up and apparently unoccupied. Feeling that something was wrong, some of the neighbors secured a ladder on Monday evening, and climbing to the window of the room Miss Henderson used as a bedroom, they peered in through the window. Hanging from a rope suspended from the centre of the room was Miss Henderson's body.

Coroner Kenney and Police Sergeant Finley were at once notified, and about nine o'clock they proceeded to Miss Henderson's home and forced an entrance. The body was removed from the rope, and after an examination by Coroner Kenney, he gave permission for its removal to Beaty's undertakings rooms. An inquest will not be held, and the body will be taken to Northumberland county for interment.

There is little doubt that Miss Henderson took her life during a fit of insanity. Death must have been practically instantaneous, and Dr. Kenney has given it as his opinion that the woman had been dead for at least two days. The suicide must, accordingly, have occurred on Saturday or Sunday.

Miss Henderson was last seen by the neighbors about May 20th. Her sons who viewed the body after it was removed from the rope upon which it was suspended, considered it possible that the death occurred eight days ago.

A CITY OF GLOOM FOR SOME NIGHTS. Amherst, June 2.-The early morning fire was in all probability caused by some person who had gained access to the barn with a night's lodging in view, dropping a lighted match or glowing tobacco ash in the hay. All the power for the city of Amherst will have to come direct from the plant at Chignecto and as this will take some little time, it is expected that Amherst will be a city of gloom for a few nights. The power plant is partially covered by insurance, being insured by Messrs. Douglas and Rogers, and H. W. Rogers. The Canada Electric plant was damaged to the extent of over fifteen thousand dollars. As stated before, this loss was partially covered by insurance. The companies which the policies are held are: Home Insurance Co., New York, \$1,000; Queen Fire Insurance, \$2,000; Nova Scotia Fire, \$3,000; Norwich Union, \$2,000; Hartford, \$5,000. A store owned by Mr. W. W. Black on the opposite side of Electric street was insured in the Royal for \$2,000.

The three tenement houses owned by Mr. C. C. Black, was insured with the Halifax Fire Insurance Co. for \$900. The barn in which the fire commenced was insured in the Sun Fire for four hundred dollars.
