London, March 14.—The British treight steamer Norwegian, of the Leyland Line with general cargo from New York, for Liverpool, was seriously damaged by an explosion which killed five of the crew yesterday of Galley Head, Consul Frost reported today. No submarine was sighted, and the consul said the explosion might have been due to a mime. The vessel was beached.

The Norwegian carried a 4.7 inch guin. Those killed were the fourth engineer, the storekeeper and three firemen, all British subjects. The single American in the crew, a cook, was saved. The consul said he was taking affidavits from the American and the ship's officers.


