## HALIFAX HAS A GRIEVANCE

Fisheries Committee of Board  
of Trade Says St. John Fish-  
eries Hearing Not Representa-  
tive.

Halifax, Feb. 13.—The fisheries committee of the Board of Trade has reported to the board that the recent session at St. John of the international fisheries conference was not representative. The committee maintained that if it was not possible to appoint on the commission at least two practical men, conversant with eastern Canada fishery conditions, the commission should associate with them a fully representative advisory board. The report regrets the fact that there was no meeting at Halifax and urges that a sitting of the commission be held here at a later date.

## MONDAY CLOSING ORDER IN U. S. IS SUSPENDED

Washington, Feb. 13.—Fuel Administrator Garfield today suspended the Monday closing order but left the way open to put it again into operation if it appears that that will be necessary. State Fuel Administrators were given a permission to keep the order in force in their states, if it appears that it should be done to relieve fuel shortage and also were authorized to put into force any other restrictive measures that special circumstances make necessary.  
The part of the Monday closing order establishing a priority list in coal distribution will be continued generally as will the embargo placed on railroads by Director General McAdoo. The operation of the priority arrangement and the embargoes, Fuel Administrator Garfield said today, promise to solve the fuel problem unless there is a return of bad weather.

## STEAMSHIP SINKS HUN SUBMARINE

American Vessel Also Reports  
That British Patrol Boats  
Capture Two U-Boats Off  
Canary Islands.

An Atlantic Port, Feb. 13.—An American steamship arriving here today reported having sunk a German submarine in the Mediterranean on Jan. 18, last, after a running fight. The steamer was not hit.  
On the outward voyage the same ship was attacked in the Mediterranean by two submarines. One was sighted off the bow of the steamer and when the captain attempted to ram the undersea boat it submerged and made off. At the same time the sun crew fought off another submarine from the stern.

## ANOTHER YARMOUTH BOY IS HONORED

Walter Davis Appointed by  
Uncle Sam to Proceed to  
France and Superintend the  
Salvage of Damaged Vessels

Yarmouth, N. S., Feb. 13.—Another Yarmouth boy has just been highly honored by receiving one of the most important appointments at the present time it is possible for a man to receive. For the past two decades has been associated with the Merritt Chapman Wrecking Company of New York, and the position he has been appointed to is head of the salvage operations in France. When the United States first declared war he at once tendered his services to the government in any capacity he could be of service.  
His offer was accepted and he has now been ordered to France to take charge of all salvage operations in which the United States was interested in that country. The job is a stupendous one. Vessels frequently strike mines or are torpedoed. Only a small percentage sink at sea and are lost altogether. The majority manage to limp into port and many sink in shallow water. It is Mr. Davis' job to salvage these vessels and hand them over to the repair shops to be again put into commission. In selecting a Yarmouth man for the place the United States government has conferred a great honor upon this town.  
H. H. Raymond, of whose career the papers have made much during the past two weeks, and Walter Davis, are two worthy sons of this old town and the town is proud of them.
