THOUSANDS FOLLOW
THE BODY OF LIEUT.
GOVERNOR LEBLANC

Cardinal Begin, Archbishop
Bruchesi and Other Distin-
guished Clergy Participate
in Funeral Services.

Quebec, Oct. 21.—The funeral service
of the late Sir P. E. LeBlanc, lieutenant-
governor of the Province of Que-
bec, was held this morning at the Basili-
ca. Despite the epidemic a great
crowd followed the corpse. The mili-
tary escort, however, did not enter the
church. Mgr. Bruchesi, archbishop of
Montreal, officiated, assisted by Mgr.
Pelletier, rector of Laval, and Father
Hudon, S. J. Abbe McGuire, of Sillery,
who attended the late governor dur-
ing his illness, received the corpse, and
while Cardinal Begin performed the
last ceremony.

The chief mourners were Capt. B.
LeBlanc, son of the deceased, who re-
turned a few months ago, M. G. Le-
Blanc, his brother, and his two sons-
in-law, Arthur Perceux, of Montreal,
and A. Costa de Buenos Aires. Lord
Richard Nevill represented the govern-
ment, Hon. P. E. Blondin the gov-
ernment, while S. Lelievre represented
the speaker of the senate and Brig-
adier General Lavery the minister and coun-
cil of militia.

HONOR ROLL.

Wounded a second time, Pte. Ed-
win Howard was admitted to hospital
in France, on Oct. 10, according to
official advice received by his wife,
Mrs. Mary Howard, 126 Watson St.,
yesterday. Ottawa advised that Pte.
Howard was suffering from gunshot
wounds in the right thigh and in the
forehead. He went overseas with the
A. S. C., in the spring of 1915, en-
listing while a member of the police
force, and after having won his ser-
geant's stripes, and having been
wounded in action, was home on leave
for six months. He left again for over-
seas in September, 1917, and later
reverted to the rank of private in or-
der to join the 26th Battalion. He
crossed to France last July.

Pte. H. P. Ryan.
D. H. Ryan of the 2, P. I., living
at 315 Princess street, received word
yesterday from Ottawa that his neph-
ew, Pte. Herbert Ryan, has been
missing since Oct. 1st. Pte. Ryan is
22 years old and went overseas in
Montreal with the 24th Battalion. He
had only returned to France from
convolescence in England after having
been wounded at Vimy Ridge.

Pte. W. L. Anderson, son of
William Anderson, 3 Chares street,
has been admitted to the 25th General
Hospital, Boulogne, France, having
been gassed on October 11th.

Pte. H. McCuskey.
Word has been received by Mrs.
James McCuskey, 45 1/2 street, that
her son, Pte. Harrison McCuskey,
had been admitted to the 22nd Casu-
alty Clearing Station. Oct. 1st, suffer-
ing from gunshot wounds in the
leg.

Pte. W. H. Blair.
W. H. Blair, 242 City Road, has
received word that his son, Pte. Wil-
liam H. Blair, had been gassed. Pte.
Blair was a member of the 13th Bat-
talion.

Pte. John Francis O'Brien.
Pte. and Mrs. John O'Brien, 25 Mer-
ritt street, have received word from
Ottawa that their only son, Pte. John
Francis O'Brien, was admitted to No.
7 Canadian General Hospital, Lettre-
ville, Oct. 11, gunshot wound, left leg.
Pte. O'Brien is 25 years of age, enlist-
ed with the 15th Battalion, went to
France about two years ago. After
spending a year in the hospital from
illness he went again to the front a
month ago.
