New York, March 30.

No cable despatches received. Yesterday being Good Friday no gull or stock quotations.

The order forbidding the clearance of vessels from Brownsville, Texas, for Mexico has been rescinded.

The Hudson River is reported free of ice 120 miles south of New York, and navigation is open. Prospects of a damaging freshet are slight.

To the Electors of Queen's Ward.

GENTLEMEN—I take this opportunity of informing you that at the close of the year, which expires on Tuesday next, I shall retire from the office of Councillor of your Ward. In doing so, it is probably but just, as well as those of you who so kindly assisted in electing me a year ago, as to myself, to explain the reasons which have induced me to adopt this course.

The office of Councillor is not one of my own seeking, but I was induced to put myself in nomination at the request of a number of the most influential and respectable men of the Ward.

At the same time, however, that I did not seek the position, the warm encouragement I received from the outburst of the canvass and the handsome vote polled, were exceedingly gratifying. I felt that I owed you a debt of gratitude for your having entrusted your interests to my hands. That debt I have endeavored faithfully and honestly to discharge, and I think you will readily admit that I have at all times carefully watched your interests to the best of my ability. I may have committed some errors, yet, so far, I have heard no complaints.

The duties of the office I have found exceedingly burdensome, taking for their own part, to spare from his profession, whatever services were required, and have not often been absent from my seat at the Board. I have thought at different times for me to retire, and have communicated my intention to some of you. But no one has been so kind as to suggest that I should retire, and I have endeavored to continue in the office, as long as I could, as I have already intimated, Mr. Lockhart has been brought to the front, and through his card has expressed his desire to represent you.

He is a merchant, one of the class whom I, as a citizen, desire to see taking more and more interest in civic matters, and I am confident in whom I believe, a large part of the Ward has sufficient confidence. Under these circumstances, I feel that I cheerfully resign into his hands the trust now held.

From a personal contest with Mr. Lockhart, I feel that neither he, the city, nor myself can be the gainer.

I claim to have had a share in several matters of public improvement, some of which are not yet fully completed, and I claim to have been successful in carrying out my intention to retire, and have communicated my intention to some of you. But no one has been so kind as to suggest that I should retire, and I have endeavored to continue in the office, as long as I could, as I have already intimated, Mr. Lockhart has been brought to the front, and through his card has expressed his desire to represent you.

In closing, let me assure you, gentlemen, that while for the present retiring from public life, I shall continue to take a deep interest in the improvement and prosperity of Queen's Ward, and the city generally.
