I have received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies an intimation that it. is the intention of Her Majesty's Government to introduce into the Imperial Parliament in the present Session a Bill for the abolition, in this and other colonies similarly circumstanced, of the power of the superior ourts in England to issue the writ of Habeas Corpus into such colonies, in coformity with the representations made by my predecessor to the Imperial Government.

I would ask your careful consideration for a measure which will be submitted to you for the purpose of securing a proper adminis-tration of bankrupt estates in Upper Canada, and also for one having for its object the establishment of well regulated gaols and local penitentiaries throughout the Province.

I have directed papers to be laid before you which show that the Imperial Government entertains no objection to the establishment of a system of free commercial intercourse between the different Provinces of British North America, if the Government and Legislatures of those Provinces can agree as to the basis upon which such an arrangement shall be carried into effect.
