SOUTH AFRICA

News from South Africa of late has been meagre in both quality and character. The campaign has become an unscrutable mystery and nobody is desirous of expressing their opinion as to how long it will take to put an end to this campaign.

The correspondent of The Times at Pretoria says:—

"In order to cope with the large number of Boers who keep in touch with Louis Botha east of the line of blockhouses from Wilge River to Greylingstad, twelve British columns are operating between the Delagoa and Natal Railways. In order to effectually clear this large area of Boers, new lines of blockhouses are being built.

"In the western Transvaal columns under Methuen, Kekewich and Hicks are sweeping the country, in conjunction with forces on the railway line and the constabulary posts. It seems blockhouses are to form the chief factor in the pacification of the country. New lines of blockhouses will soon entirely free Pretoria and Johannesburg centres of the enemy.

"The concentration of British columns south of the Delagoa Railway has withdrawn troops from north of the line with the result that the Boers are back again in that neighborhood, where horse sickness and fever do not prevail and food is plentiful. Kitchener has never had sufficient troops to carry out comprehensive operations simultaneously north and south of the Delagoa line. The need for more men is thus clearly shown."

KENTVILLE COUNCIL

The Kentville Town Council met in their Chamber last Wednesday evening. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. The following bills were read and ordered paid.

The matter regarding extra police was

brought before the Council by Coun. Cogswell. He believed that there was no further need of an extra day man. The matter was confirmed. A night watchman will be kept on until the quarantine is raised.

Mr. James Sealy was present and on motion was heard in reference to a night watchman. It was his opinion that one was necessary to be on all night to patrol the square and Margeson's block throughout the winter. The Council thought it would be best to get a petition signed by all rate payers asking for an all night service.

Disposition of Alice deWire was referred to Poor Committee, for further particulars.

The Clerk was asked to write the Medical officer in regards the Armenians who arrived here last week to see if they had been vaccinated.

Resolved that the Electric Light committee arrange a change of lighting on Leverett Avenue.

Councillor Redden asked for another light on the Kentville Bridge. Mayor Youd called attention to the lights in front of the Methodist Church not being lighted.

It was moved and seconded that the Lighting Committee look into the lighting matter of Leverett Avenue and Kentville Bridge. The committee was instructed to interview Mr. Smith in regards why the lights are not lighted every evening near the Methodist church.

Mr. F. A. Masters was present and on motion was heard in regards needs of the Fire Company. The matter was referred to the Water Committee and R. W. Eaton to visit the Fire Co. in regards their needs.

PROHIBITIONISTS

The Yarmouth Times notes the fact that Rev. C. F. Cooper, M. P. P. for Queens, has accepted a call from the Free Baptist Church of Canning, Kings County. It makes comment as follows:

"Rev. Mr. Cooper is an ardent prohibitionist, and by a recent decision of the privy council, giving the provinces the right to enact prohibitory legislation, will be able, with the assistance of Messrs. Dodge and Wickwire, the local members for Kings, to press upon Messrs. Murray, Longuey and Drysdale who, with the aid and advice of Hon. W. S. Fielding, are carrying on the affairs of the province, the necessity of prohibitory legislation in Nova Scotia. Then there is Dr. Borden, who can be relied upon to push along the matter. Mr. Cooper's removal from Queens may result in good for Nova Scotia and we shall watch with no little interest his efforts to carry to a successful issue one of the principal planks in his political platform—prohibition."

These are dreadful possibilities for those of our fellow citizens who sell or buy intoxicating liquors. Three ardent prohibitionists, like Cooper, Dodge and Wickwire, exerting their mighty pressure on three other scarcely less ardent prohibitionists, can scarcely fail to produce such a drought as never before was known in this province. The catastrophe may, however, perhaps be averted. Mr. Wickwire is, we are told, at present in Ottawa, and may be kept so busy "inspecting" one thing and other in connection with the equipment and despatch of the Yeomanry corps, that he may have no time or energy left for the assistance of Mr. Cooper. But that it is a "parlous" time for the liquor dealers and consumers in this province, must be apparent to all who have eyes to see and ears to hear.
