Imasco Scholarship Fund For Disabled Students and Mattinson Endowment Fund Scholarship For Disabled Students. Fields of Study: Undergraduate program in any field of study. Value: \$2000 annually. Purpose: To encourage Canadian disabled students to pursue university studies with the ultimate objective of obtaining a first university degree. Duration: One academic year - may be renewed upon application. Conditions: Candidates must meet the definition as provided: "A disability is a functional limitation resulting from a physical, sensory, or mental impairment, which, for an indefinite period, affects the ability of the student to perform the activities necessary to participate fully in post-secondary learning." Candidates must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents who have lived in Canada for at least two years as permanent residents. Candidates must be entering or currently enrolled in a first undergraduate degree program in a Canadian post-secondary institution. Holders of an undergraduate degree are NOT eli-

gible to apply. Deadline for receipt of completed applications is June 1st, 1996.
