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guns &c. and to prevent the Whites as far as lays in his power from trespassing on the lands allotted to the Indians - When any of the above mentioned trespasses occur, The Interpreter makes it known to the Superintendent, whose duty it is to bring the defaulters to Justice - All quarrels and differences that may exist among the Indians at the different Villages, are generally brought before the Superintendent who investigates the same in a full Council of the principal Chiefs and Warriors - and settles the same in the best manner possible - Whatever laws or regulations, are made by the Chiefs and Members of Council for the good and benefit of the Village are presented to the Supt for his sanction - And should any Indians act contrary to said Laws - He is complained of to the Superintendent - Who is generally requested by the Chiefs & principal Warriors, to be present in Council to investigate the matter - and settle it as amicably as possible - The Supt is obliged to visit the whole of the Villages in the District two or three times a year - Has the whole of the business of the Dept to transact, himself - having no Assistant Clerk or office - The distribution of His Majesty's annual Bounty to the Indians is made annually at the four Villages - at which the Superintendent is always present - and the only officer -

Answer - One Missionary - A Roman Catholic Priest (Canadian) is stationed at this Village who receives a salary from Government of forty six pounds, eight shillings & six pence per annum - formerly he used to receive a certain Equipment - but last year this was done away with - A schoolmaster is stationed at this Village whose salary is £20, 16/- per An. and a Ration per day -
