226. THE COMMERCIAL RESTRAINTS of Ireland considered, in Letters to a noble Lord, or An historical account of Affairs as far as they relate to this subject, Dublin 1797, 8vo. calf neat. Altogether a statesmanly patriotic work, yet on its publication, it was suppressed and burnt by authority, British commercial exclusiveness prevailed. It has never been republished, escaped copies are seldom heard of.
