**HOLSTEIN-FRIESIAN ASSOCIATION OF CANADA**

The 53rd annual meeting of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada will be held in the Canadian Forester's Hotel, 25 College Street, (near corner of Yonge), Toronto, Ontario, Thursday, February 3rd, 1916, at 9:30 a.m. The Executive Committee will meet on Wednesday evening, Feb. 2d, at 9:30 a.m., in the Cards-Hite Hotel, opposite the Union Station.

Annual fees.

Members of the Association are reminded that the annual due of \$1.00 is payable Feb. 1st. All remittances should be made to the secretary so that they may be properly credited to the name of the remitter. Payment of dues, etc., at the time of payment takes up valuable time and in the rush period it is hard to keep a proper record of all amounts received and to give receipts for same.

Breeders who have not yet secured a copy of Volume IV of the Year Book should make application for same at an early date in order that by the time the resolution passed at the last annual meeting the price will be \$1.00 per copy.

Mr. J. W. Richardson gives notice that he will move to amend Article VI, Section 4, "The Constitution and By-Laws" by striking out the words "and substituting therefor the following:

To be eligible for registry, all animals must be black or white in color. Animals showing the white hereditary scepter shall not be accepted for registration.

(1) Solid black.  
(2) Solid white.  
(3) Black switch.

(4) Solid black with white on tail only, extending to knees and hocks. Four legs so marked will debar from registry.

(5) Solid black with white interspersed. One leg so marked will debar from registry.

(7) Gray, or mixed black and white, generally prevailing.

(8) Patches of other colors than black and white, brown, dun, etc.

(9) Red and white.

Mr. F. R. Mallory gives notice that he will move to amend the Notice of Merit rules by amending the following graphs of the rule entitled "Confirming a Record" and substituting therefor the following:

In case a test above normal is reported, the secretary shall have authority to designate a supervisor if necessary to determine if such is necessary. If supervisor sends another supervisor to conduct a new test, which shall extend for a term of two months, the supervisor of such a test shall be honored by the association.

Records of more than fifteen pounds of butterfat by junior two-year-olds, seventeen pounds by senior three-year-olds, twenty-four pounds by junior four-year-olds, twenty-six pounds by senior four-year-olds, twenty-eight pounds by junior five-year-olds, and twenty-four pounds by mature cows shall be considered above normal, and no record will be retest. In case a retest is ordered and not followed, the record shall not be accepted unless approved by the Executive Committee of the Association.

If during any official test a supervisor finds that the animal is producing butter fat above the limit of the fixed standard for age, he shall immediately report facts to the Secretary by wire or register mail, and shall continue to report same until the day and time as another supervisor arrives to conduct a retest, or until notified by the secretary that a retest will not be necessary. Annual Banquet.

Breeders attending the annual meeting will be able to obtain Single Fair on the regular Standard Certificate Plan. Ask for the Standard Certificate Booklet to attend the Live Stock Meetings, and send the same to the Secretary if in condition to do so. The cost of this booklet is less than fifty cents. These certificates must be validated by a railway agent at Toronto for which a fee of 25¢ is paid, and charged to the bill of fare. Points east and west will be valid for the return journey up to and including Feb. 8; from points west of Fort William and points east will be valid for the agricultural shows.

The Executive Committee will meet on Wednesday, Feb. 2d, at 9:30 a.m., in the Cards-Hite Hotel, opposite the Union Station.
