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TWEED, ONT.—Hungerford Township Council have passed a by-law providing for the issue of \$3,268 of debentures for building a public school.

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT.—John Robinson, City Clerk, has just received tenders for the reconstruction of the Queen street bridge over Muddy Run.

CAMILLA, ONT.—George A. Harshaw, Clerk Township Mono, desires bids by November 15th for purchase of £1,904 sterling Northern Railway bonds.

STREETSVILLE, ONT.—J. J. Mahaffy, Village Clerk, desires bids by November 5th for purchase of \$2,796.57 4 per cent. local improvement debentures.

SLOCAN CITY, B.C.—Word comes from Edinburgh, Scotland, that a company has been formed there for the purpose of building a 100 ton smelter at this place.

BURNS, ONT.—The contract for the Hunter drain in the Township of Mornington has not been awarded and the work may be again advertised next spring.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—It has been decided to build a new rink near the Congregational church, between Graham and Light streets, to be 150 x 70 feet, cost \$4,000.

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—The Crown Knitting Mill Co. have commenced work on a new factory on Western road south, to be one storey, 250 x 50 feet, brick.

GUELPH, ONT.—At a meeting of the Finance Committee of the City Council last week, it was decided to provide ways and means for the heating of the city hall.

NORTH TORONTO, ONT.—A company is said to have purchased ten acres of land at York Mills Hill on which to build a factory for the manufacture of hygienic waters.

MOUNT FOREST, ONT.—The County Council have decided to replace the bridge over the Speed River, on line between Nichol and Eramosa, with a steel structure.

BRANDON, MAN.—W. A. Elliott, architect, will receive tenders up to Saturday, 29th inst., for installation of a steam heating plant in the Westport school, this town.

RONDEAU, ONT.—The Public Works Department at Ottawa purpose improving the harbor here by building a breakwater extending out from the east pier into the lake.

ARNPRIOR, ONT.—The Diamond Park Mineral Water Co. will probably build new bottling works here next spring and are asking the town for a nominal assessment.

STELLARTON, N. S.—Tenders are invited by D. Pottinger, manager Intercolonial Railway, Moncton, N. B., up to 31st inst., for the erection of a stores and office building at this place.

STURGEON FALLS, ONT.—Michaud & Levesque have had plans prepared for a new block to be built on Main street, but work will not likely be commenced until next spring.

TERREBONNE, QUE.—The Department of Public Works, Ottawa, are asking for tenders by Saturday, November 5, for the erection of a post office building here. Plans at the post office.

LEVIS, QUE.—Tenders for erection of a public building here will be received by F. Gelinias, Secretary Department of Public Works, Ottawa, up to Tuesday, November 8. Plans at office of Mr. Lamontagne, Mayor.

COLLINGWOOD, ONT.—Tenders for construction of wharf here will be received at the Department of Public

Works, Ottawa, up to Saturday, 29th inst. Plans on application to the Post Master.

WALKERVILLE, ONT.—By-laws were carried last week to provide \$5,000 for building a municipal stable and barn, \$22,000 for laying bitulithic pavements, and a further sum for paving Third and Fourth streets.

SPENCERVILLE, ONT.—The Township Clerk will receive tenders up to Tuesday, November 8, for the erection of an iron bridge across the Nation river, also for the erection of a wooden bridge over same river.

PRESTON, ONT.—The town has granted a loan of \$15,000 to the Metal Shingle & Siding Co. to assist them in erecting new buildings. The company will build a fireproof structure near the G.T.R. depot.

STOKES BAY, ONT.—Tenders are invited by the Department of Public Works, Ottawa, up to Wednesday, November 2, for the construction of a wharf and road approach at this place. Plans on application to the Postmaster.

ST. JOHN, N. B.—This week the surveys for the extension of the waterworks system to Loch Lomond will be commenced, under the direction of F. A. Barber, C. E., of Boston. Contracts will be given out in the early spring.

PARIS, ONT.—Charles McArthur has purchased a building lot on Jane street.—The Council have passed a by-law providing for the issue of \$10,000 of debentures for the purpose of extending and completing the electric light plant.

BEAVERTON, ONT.—It is understood that plans are being prepared by the Department of Public Works, Ottawa, for the harbor improvements to be undertaken at this place, for which an appropriation was granted at the last session of Parliament.

ST. PETER'S BAY, P. E. I.—The Department of Public Works, Ottawa, are asking for tenders until Friday, November 4, for construction of a breakwater at eastern entrance to the harbor here. Plans on application to the Postmaster and at the office of J. B. Hegan, Resident Engineer, Charlottetown.

VICTORIA, B.C.—Steps will likely be taken at an early date to erect a new building to replace the present Old Men's Home.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. are asking for tenders for the erection of offices adjoining new wharf here. Plans at the office of F. M. Rattenbury, architect.

QUÉBEC, QUE.—The Quebec and Lake St. John Railway Company have made arrangements for the building of a branch line from St. Gabriel to Gosford, a distance of fifteen miles.—The Levis County Railway Co. will likely extend their electric railway to the Chaudière Basin, about two miles up the river, in the near future.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—Carney Bros., of Marinette, Wis., have submitted a proposition to the Town Council to establish a saw mill here, to be 170 x 60 feet, with separate boiler and engine house, and to cost about \$180,000. They ask exemption from taxation for ten years, and a by-law to grant them this concession will be submitted to the ratepayers early in December.

OTTAWA, ONT.—F. Gelinias, Secretary Department of Public Works, is asking for tenders until Saturday, November 12, for the construction of the Royal Mint building in this city. Plans at the above Department.—The congregation of Stewarston Presbyterian church have in view the erection of a new edifice at the corner of Bank street and Argyle avenue. Particulars from James Montgomery, 710 Gilmour street.

FERNIE, B.C.—The Elk Lumber & Manufacturing Co. have decided to build another large saw mill at this place. The mill proper will be 40 x 220 feet, and the planing mill 60 x 40 feet, with separate power house. An electric light plant will be installed in the mill. O. A. Robertson and F. B. Lynch, of St. Paul, Minn., are president and secretary respectively of the company.—D. McCliment has purchased a lot in West Fernie on which to build a residence.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—It is learned that P. Burns & Co., wholesale butchers and packers, intend building in this city an abattoir, cold storage and pork-picking plant, to cost upwards of \$150,000. The location has not yet been announced.—Mahon, McFarlane & Mahon have made application to the City Council for permission to erect a two-storey block on Lot 14, Hastings street.—Colonel James McNaught, of New York, has under consideration the construction of a railway from Grand Forks up the north fork of the Kettle river for a distance of fifty miles.

HALIFAX, N.S.—During the month of September there were 26 permits issued by the Building Department for repairs, including one for the Plant Steamship Co., which included a brick office building to replace the burned structure. There were two permits for new residences, one on Bland street, the other on Quinpool Road, to cost about \$2,000 each.—The contract for erecting a brick structure to replace the wooden structure on the Albemarle side of the Royal Engineers' Park has not yet been awarded and the work will not likely be begun until next spring.—It is understood that Pickford & Black are having plans prepared for the reconstruction of their building recently destroyed by fire. The N. & M. Smith Fish Co. have had plans prepared for warehouses to be built on the old site, and G. P. Mitchell & Sons, importers of sugar, etc., will rebuild on their wharf site.

HAMILTON, ONT.—The hospital governors have adopted the report of the special committee which recommended that a by-law be submitted to the ratepayers in January next to raise \$50,000 for the erection of a new wing, the removal of the laundry building and for the installing of a central heating plant.—The Gurney-Tilden Co. have extensive improvements in contemplation. They will tear down the old church building on John street now used as part of the foundry and will replace it with a new structure, and another large addition will be made to the foundry on Rebecca street.—James Dodge will build a concrete block house on Emerald street, between Robert and Barton streets, to cost \$1,500.—It is reported that the Diston Saw Works Co., of Philadelphia, have made arrangements to establish a factory in this city.—The Norton Manufacturing Co. are this week taking tenders for the foundations, brick and carpenter work, roofing, etc., of a three-storey building of mill construction, 60 x 100 feet, to be erected on their property in this city. The architects are Chadwick & Beckett, of Toronto.—J. R. Armes will build a \$1,700 house on Catharine street.

MONTREAL, QUE.—The sum of \$15,000 is required in order to complete the new maternity hospital building, and the general public has been asked to provide this amount.—Tenders are desired by Tuesday, November 8, for construction of substructure of Atwater Ave. bridge at the Lachine canal. Plans at the office of the Superintendent Engineer of Canals.—Plans of post office building to be erected at Terrebonne, Que., may be seen at the office of Lacroix & Piché, architects, this city.—Building permits have been granted as follows: L.
