## WINNIPEG MARKET LETTER

(Office of The Grain Growers' Grain Company, Limited, May 29, 1916)

**Wheat**—There was a range of about 5 cents per bushel on Winnipeg futures during last week. The low points were touched on Tuesday and the high points on Friday. For the week May prices show a loss of 1 cent, July 11 cent, October 21 cents. Reports from some of the winter wheat states during the early part of the week were more favorable and crop estimates were better. Later advice told of hot dry weather doing serious damage and a strong market resulted on Friday, but rains fell in those districts on Friday night and a reaction in prices took place on Saturday. The amount of export business reported during the week was small, but cash wheat demand was good, as the grain was required to fill chartered vessels again. With only a few days of the month remaining, premiums are still paid for contract grades of wheat.

**Oats**—Prices have been steady and demand good. The premium for May futures was a feature and on Thursday May was selling at 24 cents over July. Closing prices on Saturday show a loss of 11 cents on May and 11 cents on July.

**Barley**—Prices fluctuated very little and trading was light. Saturday's close was unchanged for May futures and 1 cent lower than the previous week for 3 Canada Western.

**Flax**—Shows a gain for the week of 14 cents on May and 1 cent on July. Early in the week there was a sharp break, which was recovered later.

## The Livestock Markets

**Toronto, May 25.**—Dunn & Leveck report cattle on the Toronto market as follows: "The market opened on Monday with a good demand for all classes of cattle and we had the best cattle trade on record at the Union stockyards. There were some very good loads of butcher cattle on sale and they were quickly picked up. We made \$8.50 per car for two best loads, this being a high record for loads of cattle at these yards. The quality was generally good. Through the balance of the week receipts were light. On Wednesday the trade was a little slow on account of it being a holiday and the market closed fairly strong with everything sold. The butcher cow trade was very satisfactory this week. Good butcher bulls are wanted and selling high. We do not look for such heavy supplies of butcher cattle during the next few weeks and the markets should be very good as there cannot be a great many cattle offering until the grass cattle come in."

The demand for good springers has been strong this week, buyers having generally more orders than they could handle. The prairie governments have been buying here regularly, one department paying an average of \$85 for a hundred good animals. \$10.90 was paid for swine fed and watered.

**Winnipeg, May 21.**—The Livestock Department of The Grain Growers' Grain Co. reports receipts of livestock at the Union stockyards, Winnipeg, the past week as follows: Cattle, 859; calves, 250; sheep and lambs, 6; hogs, 3,900.

With fairly liberal receipts the end of last week there was an active demand for all kinds of cattle at strong prices. Trade opened up on Monday on light receipts at strong prices, several choice cars of steers bringing from \$9.00 to \$9.25. Medium butcher cattle and cows are also selling proportionately high. Trade on stockers and feeders remains about steady. We look for cattle values to remain strong as we do not expect heavy enough supplies to break the market. There was a fair run of veal calves forward. Choice stuff weighing 125 to 200 pounds bring \$7.50 to \$8.50, common to fair \$6.00 to \$7.00. There were no sheep or lambs offered during the week. Good quality sheep would bring \$6.75 to \$7.50, and choice lambs \$8.00 to \$9.00.

Select hogs closed last week at \$10.75 fed and watered. The market opened on Monday this week at \$10.75 with a weaker feeling and Tuesday there was a further decline to \$10.50. On Wednesday there was a further decline to \$10.25. This drop in hog values is due to lower prices both on the Eastern and Western markets.

Hogs are rather drabby and weak this morning (May 29). Eastern packers demand has fallen off considerably and in consequence our prices in the market are considerably weaker. All markets show a 10 to 15 cent decline on hogs and it looks as if the packers had control of the situation just at present.

**Calgary, May 27.**—The Livestock Department of the Alberta Farmers' Co-operative Elevator Co. report last week's Alberta stockyards receipts as follows: Horses, 312; cattle, 382; hogs, 2,748; sheep, 100. This week's receipts were: Horses, 167; cattle, 817; hogs, 1,256; sheep, 19.

Outward shipments were 7 cars cattle New Westminster, 9 cars cattle Edmonton, 4 cars hogs Winnipeg, 2 cars hogs New Westminster, 1 mixed car hogs and cattle Vancouver. Cattle maintained their steadiness at \$8.15 for top steers, with no Alberta or B.C. grass cattle in sight. Hogs sold through the week at \$10.25 till Friday, when they dropped to \$10.00, notwithstanding the lower receipts, all select hogs on the market only bringing this price. Lower Eastern markets and no demand was the cause of it all. (Hogs this week a year ago, \$8.50.)

All shippers of cattle on and after 1st June are required by recent amendment to the Stock Inspection Act to have them inspected previous to shipment. No certificate of inspection will be issued until the shipper supplies the inspector with a proper memorandum of sale.

## Country Produce

**WINNIPEG PRODUCE**—Note: Prices quoted are all f.o.b. Winnipeg unless otherwise stated.

**Butter**—Dairy butter has dropped 1 cent since last week's quotations owing to the increased supply of superior creamery butter. Probably a further drop would be registered if this were it not for the cool weather which has prevailed as steadily. No. 1 dairy and round lots are quoted the same as previously, 20 cents for the former and 17-18 cents for the latter.

**Eggs**—Eggs are 1-2 cent higher than last week, being quoted at 21-22 cents. The weather has had something to do with this also, but careful grading and selection of eggs will insure country sellers a fairly steady market. Too many are not taking great enough care in grading eggs. Considerable premium could be secured by shipping to city or town customers.

**Potatoes**—Potatoes are the same as last week at practically all Western produce markets.

**Cream**—Cream prices are down 4 cents all round from those quoted in last week's issue. There is a plentiful supply of both sour and sweet cream arriving in Winnipeg at present. Sweet cream amounts to about 25 per cent of the total supply. This is quoted at 53 cents and sour at 26 cents. Thus there is a spread of 7 cents. Little need be said regarding the desirability of careful handling in order to get the sweet cream price.

**Hay**—No change since last week's prices and only No. 2 grade quoted.
