

Of *Henry Rose*; praying for a Free Grant of one hundred acres of land, in consideration of his services as a Volunteer in the War of 1812.

The Honorable Mr. *Holton*, from the Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented to the House the Seventh Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have considered the Bill to amend the Act incorporating the Bank of *Northumberland*, and have agreed to several amendments thereto, which they submit for the adoption of Your Honorable House.

The Honorable Mr. Solicitor General *Cockburn*, from the Standing Committee on Expiring Laws, presented to the House the First Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have carefully examined the List of Expiring Laws, as prepared by the Law Clerk, and a Bill has been drafted in conformity thereto, which the Chairman of Your Committee has been instructed to present to Your Honorable House.

On motion of Mr. *Dufresne (Montcalm)*, seconded by Mr. *McKellar*,

*Ordered*, That the entries in the Journals of this House of Tuesday last, in respect to the passing of the Bill, from the Legislative Council, intituled, "An Act to provide for ascertaining what persons have rights in the Commons of *Berthier* and *Isle du Pads*," and also, the Bill, intituled, "An Act to incorporate the *Ursuline* Academy of *Chatham*," be now read.

And the same were read accordingly.

*Resolved*, That a Message be sent to the Honorable the Legislative Council, informing their Honors that their Bill, intituled, "An Act to provide for ascertaining what persons have rights in the Commons of *Berthier* and *Isle du Pads*," and also, the Bill, intituled, "An Act to incorporate the *Ursuline* Academy of *Chatham*," which were carried back to that House, as having been passed without amendments, were so carried back in error, and requesting that their Honors will return the said Bills.

*Ordered*, That Mr. *Dufresne (Montcalm)* do carry the said Message to the Legislative Council.

*Ordered*, That the Honorable Mr. Solicitor General *Cockburn* have leave to bring in a Bill to continue for a limited time the several Acts therein mentioned.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read for the first time; and ordered to be read a second time, at the next sitting of the House.

The Honorable Mr. *McDougall*, one of Majesty's Executive Council, delivered to Mr. Speaker, a Message from His Excellency the Governor General, signed by His Excellency.

And the said Message was read by Mr. Speaker, all the Members of the House being uncovered, and is as followeth:—

Her Majesty includes Her ancient Colony of Newfoundland in these congratulations to all her faithful Subjects.
