Northland's Soldiers Enroute to Kingston

There Are One Officer and Ninety-Seven of the Rank.

Kingston, Dec. 30.—Two returned officers from the S.S. Grampan arrived in Kingston on Thursday. They were Lieut. H. Roe, Campbellford, and Lieut. Quinn, Flavélock. Lieut. Roe went overseas as an N.C.O. in the 139th Battalion and won his D.C.M. for bravery on the field. Later he was granted a commission in the 7th Canadian Battalion. Lieut. Quinn went overseas in May, 1918, with the Canadian Tank Battalion.

A troop train carrying one officer and ninety-seven other ranks for Military District No. 3 left Halifax at 1.30 o'clock on Friday morning and passed through Truro, N.S., at five o'clock. These men are from the S.S. Northland, which docked at Halifax on December 25th. The quarantine on the ship has been lifted. The men arrived in Kingston on Sunday.

## EVANGELIST HONEYWELL OPENS BIG REVIVAL

Tells Congregations Why Revivals are Needed in the World To-day

Rev. I. E. Honeywell, the well-known evangelist from Chicago, opened a campaign in Belleville on Sunday at Bridge St. Methodist Church. The first services augur well for the success of the movement, which has been inaugurated by a number of the local churches. Prof. Towey is the choir leader and tenor soloist.

The revivalist spent ten weeks as assistant to Billy Sunday in New York City and has been for fifteen years at evangelistic work. His first appearance in Belleville made a deep impression on his large congregations. Like all evangelists he is original and unlike any other. He is energetic and earnest. Keeping up a rapid fire for three-quarters of an hour. He does not use dramatic methods as they have been used by other evangelists who have visited the city, trusting to his sincerity and the truth of his words to get his message home to the hearts of his hearers.

Last evening's address was on the need of revival. Every great denomination today he said, is the result of the revival spirit. Mr. Moody, the noted evangelist said: "The longer I live, the more I believe in revivals." The great work is soul saving. The majority of Christians have been converted in revivals. Poor friends of God are they who claim they do not believe in revivals. We have revivals in business, politics, sports and strikes, why not in religion? God supplies the means, but does not send a legion of angels to do man's work.

## Pope's Influence for Just Peace

Issues Statement on Receiving Noted Prelates of Sacred College Christmas Time.

Rome, Dec. 30.—Pope Benedict received the members of the Sacred College who presented the Christmas wishes to him. Twenty-three cardinals and many Bishops and Prelates were present.

In reply to the greetings the Pope expressed a wish that the decision of the coming peace congress not only would establish order but would give a new birth to "human sentiment, which will render communion with our brothers and the sacrifices made for their sweet."

The Pontiff declared that he would do all in his power to facilitate acquiescence in the congress in order for a just peace.

## No Peace Terms for Bolsheviki

Allies Refuse to Recognize the Present Government of Russia.

London, Dec. 28.—The Allied governments since Christmas have again been approached by the Bolshevik government of Russia regarding peace terms. These differ in no respect from those put forward by M. Litvinoff, the former Bolshevik ambassador at London, through the Norwegian government in November. The proposals have met with no response, as they emanate from a government which is not recognized by the Allies. The whole Russian question is at present under discussion among the Allied governments.

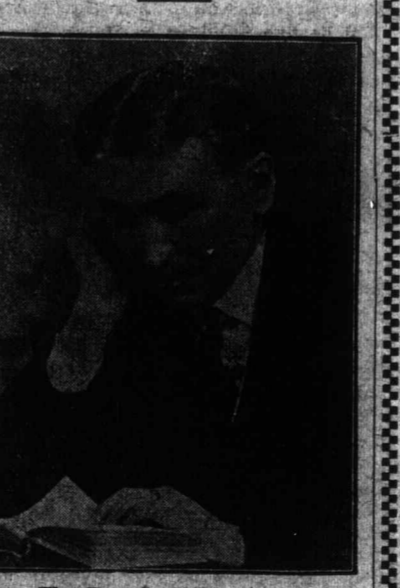
## Escaped Officers by Leap From Train
