City News Items.

Will Close
 Eagle Place merchants have agreed to close their stores at 1 o'clock on Thursday afternoon.

Will Suspend Him
 Manager Rube Deneau stated this morning that if Pitcher Worfel, who has been expected for the past two weeks, does not report by to-night he will be placed on the suspended list.

Rube is at a loss to know what to make of Worfel's repeated failures to report but he is of the opinion that Worfel is doing training duties at his home, where the weather is better and when he does put in an appearance he will be in the pink of condition. Rain prevented the men from going to the park this morning and the squad indulged in a light work out in the M.C.A. gym. Basketball and handball was played. The pitchers kept their arms in condition, working with the catchers. Vincent Molyneux is still with the team and will likely stay until Worfel appears.

Local Underwriters

A meeting of the local underwriters' Association was held in the North American Life Office yesterday afternoon. The vice-president occupied the chair. Reports of committees were received, and other business was transacted. During the past month a new constitution has been drawn out, and this was presented in printed form to the meeting. It is the purpose of the Association to stamp out practices that are detrimental to life insurance generally, and to policy holders in particular. The Association thinks that it is its duty to protect the public, as far as

possible from any unscrupulous or ignorant agents who may be in the business. An extensive advertising campaign is being projected, of which details will be submitted at the next meeting. The financial affairs of the association, upon which report was made, proved to be in a satisfactory condition.

MR. WILLIAM IRWIN

Prominent Brantford Resident Passed Away Early This Morning.

Wm. Irwin of 18 Pearl St. was called to the great beyond early today. The deceased, who was a bookkeeper at the Binder Twine Company, was a lifelong Free Mason and a member of the Sons of England. He was 49 years of age and leaves to mourn his loss, besides a vast circle of friends, a wife and eight children. The funeral will take place on Thursday at Greenwood cemetery.

CITY COUNCIL IN BRIEF SESSION

(Continued from Page 1) and sent it back for further consideration.

Welcome to the Duke.
 Mayor Spence explained some of the formalities planned for the Duke's reception on Saturday might have to be eliminated, owing to His Royal Highness having to conduct military inspection at the depot on his arrival. In that case there might be a number who would not have time to be presented and the Mayor wanted the reason understood. He hoped that the Duke would be well impressed with the beauty, health and happiness of Brantford as a city and trusted that all the aldermen would be on hand. It was proposed to accommodate as far as possible all in the visit to the different places of interest and beauty around the city. The route of the vice-regal party is given elsewhere in this issue.

Firemen's Holidays

When the petition from the Brantford firemen to have their summer holidays increased from seven days to ten, Ald. Ryerson opposed the same, and when the vote was taken to file the petition, the motion was carried on a show of hands. Filing the petition means that the petition is shelved for this year at least. Ald. Ryerson stated that there was no provision in the estimates of his committee for any such increased expenditure, as substitutes would have to be secured. He thought the firemen had been pretty fairly treated in the past, an increase in salary having been granted last year and the men having previously secured a day off each week, for which they were paid.

Ald. Broadbent thought that everybody was entitled to one day off a week. While the firemen had one, they also had a very long day when they were on duty. They have to put in 24 hours. He believed, if possible, the firemen should get the three days extra. It is not this year, certainly next year. When firemen did work they had real work to do.

Ald. Charlton could not understand why the petition should be filed. The firemen only had seven days a year, and even then cannot leave the city, which wasn't a holiday at all.

Ald. Ryerson denied Ald. Charlton's statement. The men could leave the city during their seven days holidays. There were few workmen in the city who had ten days holidays paid for, and the workmen who paid the shot should not be asked to make any increases for the firemen at this stage.

Finance Recommendations

The committee on finance reported as follows:
 That a grant of \$15 be made to the C. O. F. to help defray expenses of procuring the hall for the meetings of the High Court to be held here this summer.

That your committee be empowered to consider the License By-Law and report thereon.

That your committee be empowered to take up the question of the telephones supplied to the various municipal offices and report thereon.

That the petition of Robert Hunter and others, and Joseph Davis and others re. pool rooms license, be filed and that your committee does not recommend any action be taken.

That the matter of insurance of various municipal buildings be left in the hands of the committee already appointed to investigate the insurance thereon, and that this council would request that the various boards and institutions of this city having control of the buildings should consider the question of insurance thereon on the lines set out in the report of said committee.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Manager for Street Railway

The committee on railways reported as follows:
 That your committee be empowered to advertise for a manager for the Street Railway, as your committee are now of the opinion that action should be taken in this matter.

Fixed Assessment.

Fixed assessment of \$2,500 for 10 cars, was granted the Brantford Industrial and Realty Company on its plant and property on Alice Street, to be known as the Brantford Piano Case Company. The firm is to employ not less than 25 hands for ten years. Ald. Broadbent stating that it expected to increase the number of employees within a year to 75 or 100 and they would be all skilled mechanics. Ald. Broadbent further said they would be an important and consequently quite an allied addition to the industrial population. The company proposed to manufacture pool tables, said Ald. Broadbent, but this caused smiles around the board. The factory building is now completed and machinery will be installed in short order. A by-law received the usual three readings without any discussion.

Garbage Contract

Ald. Pitcher brought in the report

of the buildings and grounds committee, which recommended:

(1) That the chief's office and bedroom at the fire hall and other rooms be repaired and the interior of the hall be decorated to the satisfaction of the committee.

(2) That the contract for a garbage route be given to Mr. Leslie Anghuish. Ald. Pitcher said the committee had found conditions at the Fire Hall very deplorable, and the city could not expect the chief of the department to put up with them.

Ald. Broadbent had an amendment to the report. He moved that Mr. William Holder get the garbage route contract instead of Mr. Anghuish. Ald. Bragg had a similar amendment, but Ald. Broadbent got the floor first.

Mayor Spence wanted to know what "satisfactory to the committee" meant in regard to the decoration of the fire hall. He thought the paragraph was pretty broad.

Ald. Pitcher said the money would be economically expended.

Amendment Carried

The amendment was carried on the following vote: Yea, Bragg, Broadbent, Quinlan, Calbeck, Sutcliffe, Woolson, Charlton, 7.

Again Comes Up

In the last hour of act, Ald. Hollinger introduced a motion that the buildings and grounds committee report appointing William Holder be reconsidered and the name of Leslie Anghuish be inserted in his stead.

Mayor Spence doubted the legality of the resolution and council sat back for a few minutes until His Worship looked up the Spalding rule book.

The Mayor finally quoted Speaker Hoyle's recent decision against the Ontario Government refusing to allow a matter already dealt with to be reintroduced at the same session. He ruled it out of order.

The Mayor said if there was a doubt about the vote it might be left over for two weeks.

Ald. Sutcliffe could see no reason why it should stand over again.

The Mayor said he was sure the vote was 7 to 6, but there were 14 Aldermen present. (Ald. Wood was out of the room at the time.)

Ald. Pitcher agreed with the Mayor's ruling and Ald. Charlton objected to any further dilly dallying with things. The appointment had been regularly made.

Notes of Meetings

A by-law to authorize the construction of a storm sewer on the local improvement plan on Wellington St., 170 feet westerly from Market St. was passed.

J. H. Lampkin and others petitioned to have a by-law passed against the use of soft coal in private houses, such being detrimental to the health and happiness of the surrounding community. It was referred to the buildings and grounds committee.

Rev. C. E. Jenkins and others, petitioned against the issuing of a license for a pool-room in the East Ward. The license was not granted.

The quorum present was as follows: Mayor Spence, Ald. Hollinger, Quinlan, Sutcliffe, Sigman, Charlton, Pitcher, English, Ryerson, Robinson, H. L. Wood, Broadbent, Bragg, Calbeck, Woolson.
