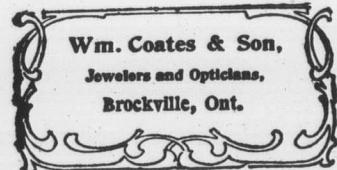

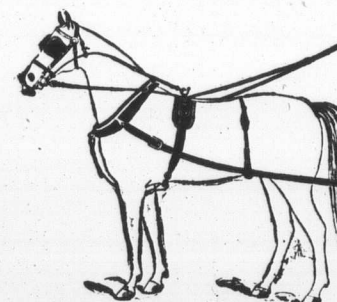

Last Thursday, in the General Hospital, doctors removed all the fingers of Adam Emmon's right hand, three fingers of his left hand and a portion of his left foot was amputated. Emmons, it will be remembered, was badly frozen near Athens last spring. It is thought he will recover.

On Friday evening a son of John Cook of Westport had a narrow escape. He was in the act of stabling a team of horses when a bolt of lightning struck the barn killing one horse instantly.
