The market Saturday morning was largely attended with a varied line of offerings principally vegetables in small quantities. Eggs were plentiful at 24 and 25c per dozen for new laid. Some maple sugar and syrup was offered, but not of this year's vintage. The demand was brisk, and principal quotations were: Veal, 10c and 12c lb. Lamb, 14c and 17c lb. Pork, 11c lb. Chickens, per pair, \$1.50. Eggs, per dozen, 24c, 25c. Butter, 35c lb.

DEPARTMENTAL EXAMINATIONS

The date for the High School Entrance examination this year has been set for June 21st. The examinations will last for three days. The matriculation will start on June 14th and will be over by June 30th. The honor and scholarship matriculation will begin on June 9th and the Upper School Entrance into the Faculties of Education on the same day. The middle-school entrance into the Normal schools will start on June 24th, winding up on June 30th.

The supplemental examinations for those who did not pass or try to pass in June will begin on 7th of September, winding up on the 17th.
