AN EXPLANATION.

George G. Martin Tells How He Became a Lawyer.

Declares For Mr. Pleasance's Benefit That It Was Not by Any Fluke.

To The Planet.—While The Planet is not an Arannah threshing floor to winnow private grievances, yet, as my professional position was assaulted in a cowardly, dark insinuation by John Pleasance, I ask liberty to reply. The powers of law society were subsequently enlarged by the legislature, so as to cover just such difficulties as mine and many others. If Jack and his corn-stack solicitor will look up vol. 13 N. S. of the Canada Law Journal, 1877, page 52, they will find the following in the transactions of the law society:—

"The petition of Geo. G. Martin was read. Ordered, that on proper proof of his service, and the bona fides thereof, and his service under contract, according to the rules of the society, he be permitted to present himself for examination."

There was no trouble to prove the contract and the service thereunder, as Mr. McGregor was then living and in active practice, and the above stringent order was fully complied with. Some years ago I acted upon this order and presented myself for the solicitor's examination, and passed it, too. Before doing so, it was required that I obtain a certificate from local Q. C.'s, and one of the county judges that I was "a fit and proper person to be admitted as a solicitor." At this time I had lived here some time a clerk in the office of Wm. Douglas, Q. C., crown attorney. All the Q. C.'s then in the city, I think, readily signed this certificate, including Douglas, Q. C., himself, who is an honored bench and member of the privy council of the society. More than this, this certificate was given with the bold signature of the eminent jurist, scholar and author, his honor Judge Woods. Now, I did not pass as barrister under the act allowing solicitors of ten years' standing to be through without an examination. I was of less than six years' standing, and had to undergo an examination. I carried every position at the

hands down, without asking or receiving any odds whatever. Perhaps I erred in not having a certificate of good character from Irish Jack. The devil himself fortified with such a credential would pass as a high-toned moral gentleman, and would be as fully qualified for a liquor license as John himself. Having been in active practice before Judge Woods for over ten years, the learned judge would give me now a much better certificate than he did before, and those who doubt it are kindly referred to him. During all these ten years no complaint or charge was ever made to the Law Society against me for any professional or dishonorable conduct or otherwise—and this is more than can be said as to more than one lawyer here—so that I don't think the learned Q. C.'s who vouched for me have any reasons to regret.

Jack and his legal bean-stalk will find all the records of my service and admission in Osgoode Hall, Toronto. Jack is not satisfied with being the "Big Push" of the liquor traffic, but is now banking after the guardianship of the Law Society. God forbid!
