The Engagement in Which the Canadians Were Slaughtered.

Paardeberg, Orange Free State, Feb. 20 (via Modder River. Wednesday, Feb. 21.)-One of the costliest actions of the war occurred at Pagrdeberg Drift, Sunday, Feb. 18.

Gen. Kelly-Kenny, in his pursuit of Gen. Cronje, caught bis rear guard at Lip drift and followed the burghers to the Boer laager at Koc-

The drift action, began at daybreak, the mounted infentry driving the Boer rear guard up the river toward the main body, while another body of mounted infantry manneuvered on the right front and flank of the Boers.

The British main body advanced to

The British main body advanced to outflank the Boer laager on the north bank of the river. Gen. Kelly-Kenny having seized two drifts, found the Boers strongly enclosed and ordered an attack, with the Highland brigade on the left and Gen. Knox's brigade on the centre and right, while Gen. Smith-Dorrien's brigade, comprising the Canadian contingent crossed the the Canadian contingent, crossed the river and advanced along the north
