### HUMOR IN ENGLISH SIGNS

Ap Quotations Used by Tradesmen to  
Attract Custom.

There is quite a harvest of wit and  
wisdom to be gleaned by the observ-  
ant eye from the notices with which  
tradesmen seek to attract custom,  
and it might also be worth the while  
of out of the way things to make a  
collection of the wayside gems, many  
of which blush almost unseen. Many  
of the cleverest of these notices which  
the writer has added little by little  
to his collection consist of really  
witty adaptations of well known  
quotations and proverbs.

An enterprising cycle dealer in a  
Yorkshire town, whose name is Net-  
tle, turns his prickly cognomen to  
business account in this singularly  
apt quotation from "Henry IV."  
"Out of this nettle danger I pluck  
the flower safety," while a customer  
in the same town, whose sympathetic  
name is Love, informs his customers  
in letters half a foot long that "Love  
hath a large mantle." If capacity be  
a virtue in mantles, Mr. Love de-  
serves to have a large sale.

A provision merchant, again—in a  
north country town, turns the same  
name to useful account in this ap-  
propriate notice, which "speaks for it-  
self." "George Herbert says 'Love  
is a personal debt,' but this Love's  
terms are strict cash."

Business rivalry often develops  
quite unexpected resources of wit and  
wisdom in men of business. A few  
months ago a grocer and provision  
dealer called Little had a practical  
monopoly of the custom of a small  
town in the Midlands, when, to his  
annoyance, a rival settled in the  
place and opened a shop under the  
name of John Strong. Within a few  
days this dignified protest appeared  
in the outraged grocer's window:  
"Man wants but little below."  
"But the newcomer was a  
man of at least equal learning and  
powers of quotation, for on the fol-  
lowing day this supplementary notice  
appeared in his window: "The lost  
tobacco by Farr." Within a few  
hours his rival's window blossomed  
into one large announcement: "Far  
better tobacco than the best tobacco  
by Farr."

Perhaps better still were the rival  
notices of two watchmakers, one of  
whom was called I. Wise. Mr. Wise  
had adopted as his business motto,  
"He is Wise that's wise in time."  
To this the next day was added by  
his rival, who was called Wadsworth:  
"He is oft the wisest man who is  
not Wise at all."

Many business men make attractive  
advertisements by humorous play on  
their names when they lend them-  
selves to this purpose. The proprie-  
tor of a wayside inn in one of the  
home counties makes clever use of his  
name, Day, to attract custom, by  
displaying a sign of a rising sun, and  
appears this legend in gilt letters:

Won't you come into my parlor,  
Gentle stranger, pray,  
For you'll have to travel farther  
To pass a happier day.

Another publican who boasts the  
curiously inappropriate name of Isaac  
Drinkwater has adopted this motto:  
"I. Drinkwater, but my customers  
drink the best of ale."

Mr. Knott, a draper in a west  
country town, makes this appeal for  
custom. "Many drapers are extor-  
sionists in their prices. I am Knott." And  
not many miles from Mr. Knott is  
a village tinker whose name is  
Dunn, and whose modest motto is:  
"What is done is done, but it's not  
done well unless it's done by Dunn."

By no means the least clever of  
these humorous trade advertisements  
was that of a bookseller called Hart,  
who supplied for many years all the  
books used in a local grammar school.  
Mr. Hart's business motto was this  
couplet:

Who in life's race would fain a good  
couplet:  
Should always get his "books by  
Hart."

Best Used as a Church.  
The parish of Holme, in Fly dioc-  
ese, England, has in consequence of  
the drainage of the fens, especially  
the famous Whittlesea mere, so ex-  
tended itself that the point of the  
parish is practically out of reach  
of their parish church. The vicar to  
assist him in getting at these out-  
side parishioners, is using a kind of  
houseboat, which he moves to the  
point to point on the large fen dyke  
canalized river surrounding three-  
fourths of the parish. The craft, fit-  
ted up as a church, has accommoda-  
tions for about 40, and in fine weath-  
er, all the windows to the leeward  
being thrown open, additional wor-  
shippers can participate in the ser-  
vice from the dyke bank.

Not a Member.  
Employment in a library does not  
always imply a possession of ex-  
tensive knowledge. This is evi-  
denced by an anecdote related of a  
rector of a rural English church in Lon-  
don for a visit. A knotty theologi-  
cal point had presented itself for so-  
lution which required reference to  
the authorities. Being a guest of  
the Athenaeum club, whose exten-  
sive library was always a feature of  
interest, he resolved to make use of  
it. Approaching an attendant who  
it happened, was but recently em-  
ployed, he asked "whether Justin  
Martyr was in the library."

lord," was the solemn reply, "but  
I'll go and ask the porter."

Jewish Court in England.

Britain known as Beth Din, which

### FISSET AND DEWET.

The French Canadian Tells Boer General  
of Canadian Constitution.

A pleasant event occurred this  
evening—the return of Surgeon-Cap-  
tain Fisset. I have already told of  
his being left behind at Heilbron,  
writes Lieut. Hamilton in the Globe,  
from Elandfontein Junction on June  
12, and falling into the hands of the  
Boers. He soon recovered, but was  
detained by them for some days.  
Then General Macdonald came along  
with his Highland Brigade, Heilbron  
once more changed hands, and Cap-  
tain Fisset was free. He lost no time  
in rejoining his corps, and acknowl-  
edges that he was very homesick  
when separated from his moving fam-  
ily.

Dr. Fisset was fairly well treated,  
and Christian Dewet, the Boer Gen-  
eral, who has several brilliant feats  
of arms to his credit, was especially  
civil. They had a talk of half an  
hour. At first the Boers were amaz-  
ed to find a Frenchman in the Brit-  
ish uniform, and when they grasped  
the fact that he was a French-Can-  
adian great interest was shown.  
General Dewet inquired with the  
greatest interest about the Canadian  
constitution, and asked Captain  
Fisset how the French were treated,  
whether their language was allowed,  
and a variety of other points  
bearing upon the relations of the  
two races. Evidently Dewet, who  
is making a superb stand now, is  
looking ahead to a future co-opera-  
tion between two races. Captain  
Fisset was very warmly welcomed in  
camp, all being delighted to see him  
again.

### Quit It.

To get a broad comprehensive  
view of human nature stand at the  
church door on Sunday morning and  
hear the remarks of the congregation.  
Some old skinkins, who never reliev-  
ed a widow's sigh or smoothed the  
path of childhood's feet with a cop-  
per cent, will grunt out his com-  
plaint about the churches.

Some brainless, soulless  
butchers, who, has to keep off ennu-  
l with theatre going or euche par-  
ties, will lip out some criticism  
about the tiresomeness of this con-  
tinual talk about sin and its results.

three nights out of six, and he turns  
up his nose at the vulgarity and  
plainness of the preacher. Another

### Seeing the Invisible.

By means of the spectroscopic  
eye of the scientist is now enabled  
to direct the presence in an electric  
spark of a particle of the metal cal-  
cium weighing only one three-hund-  
red-billionth of an ounce. If ten  
such particles were consumed each  
second of time, a piece of calcium  
the size of a mustard seed would  
spark of a particle of the metal cal-  
cium light of this sort for 15 cen-  
turies. This is the instrument with  
which the composition of the stars  
is being studied. Each metal has a  
characteristic colored flame, and by  
examining the light from a star with  
the spectroscopic light is analyzed

light from distances so inconceivable  
has made it bear their message,  
telling of these chemical composi-  
tions, and we have learned to read  
the messages they bring us with as  
great certainty as though we had a  
piece of the star in our laboratories.

That's for the funeral."

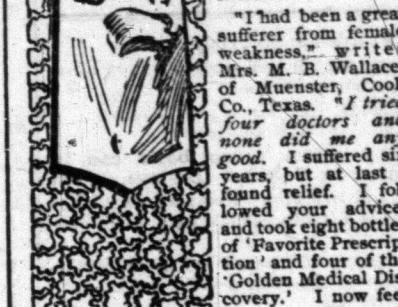
