Messins, May 13.—The eruptions of Etna and Stromboli volcances increased as the night came on. An enormous volume of smoke and quantities of red-hot projectiles are being thrown out from Etna in all directions. There are also continued loud explosions and earth shocks. These latter are especially severe at the Etna Observatory, which is at an elevation of 9,000 feet, and only 1,700 feet away from the crater. The observatory lies above the forest district in a zone where scarcely any animal life exists. In winter this is covered with snow and in summer with dry lays.

Surrounded by the little group in the cemetery, Dr. Snider went through with the operation of removing the kidneys. One was found practically untouched, while the other was partially gone.
