

## BY-LAW NO.

A By-Law to authorize aid by the Corporation of the City of Chatham, for the promotion of a factory in the said City for the manufacture of Plumbers' Brass goods, and to provide for the issue of debentures of the said Corporation, to the amount of \$20,000.00, and to raise the sum required therefor.

Provisionally adopted the 6th day of May, A. D. 1907.  
Finally passed the ..... day of ..... A. D. 1907.

WHEREAS it is proposed by Louis A. Cornelius, Harold C. Cornelius and others to seek incorporation of a Company by Letters Patent, under the name of "Canadian Wolverine Company, Limited," for the purpose of building, equipping and operating a factory and works in the said City of Chatham, for the manufacture of Plumbers' Brass Goods.

AND WHEREAS the said Louis A. Cornelius and Harold C. Cornelius have applied to the Municipal Council of the City of Chatham, on behalf of the said proposed Company, to grant aid for the promotion of such manufacture.

AND WHEREAS the said Council is desirous of granting aid for the promotion of such manufacture, by way of a loan of \$20,000.00 to the said Company when incorporated, to be advanced upon the completion of the building and equipment of the said factory and when the same is ready for operation, (which shall not be later than the first day of January, A. D. 1908), and forthwith, after the beginning of operations therein to its capacity as hereinafter provided, (to be repaid in twenty annual consecutive instalments of \$1,000.00 each, with interest on the principal sum from time to time unpaid, at 4 per cent. per annum, at the end of each year after the date of the making of the said loan, with the privilege to the said Company of paying off the whole amount of the said loan at any time during the said term of twenty years), and a free supply of water from the Chatham Water Works for the said factory's use in its said business, (not to exceed, however, at any time 3,500 gallons per day), free of charge for the period of ten years from the beginning of operations as aforesaid on the part of the said Company, and exemption from taxation, other than for school purposes, local improvements or frontage rates, of the property occupied by and used in connection with the said factory or the business to be carried on therein as aforesaid, for the period of ten years from and after the first day of January, A. D. 1908, upon the following terms and conditions:

1. THAT Canadian Wolverine Company, Limited, shall be duly incorporated as a Joint Stock Company with a Capital Stock of at least \$40,000.00, in shares of \$100.00 each, of which the said Louis A. Cornelius and Harold C. Cornelius shall subscribe for and fully pay up or procure to be subscribed for and fully paid up not less than \$30,000.00.

2. THAT the said Canadian Wolverine Company, Limited, do forthwith after incorporation aforesaid, purchase and own absolutely in its own right a site for, and do build and suitably equip, and thereafter continuously maintain and operate, at some suitable place within the limits of the said City of Chatham, a factory and plant for in the manufacture of Plumbers' Brass Goods, for a period of at least twenty years from the establishment thereof.

3. THAT the said Company will expend the sum of \$20,000.00 in so acquiring a site for the said factory, and in the erection, and the further sum of \$12,000.00 in the equipment thereof, (which factory shall be fully completed and equipped and ready for operations in the business aforesaid, not later than the first day of January, A. D. 1908).

4. THAT the said Company will, during the term of twenty years from the commencement of its operations, continuously employ in the said business not less than twenty-five employees (exclusive of its officers), and will pay annually in wages to its said employees not less than \$12,000.00; provided, however, that this condition shall not be binding upon the said Company should it be against or contrary to the will of its officers or directors, stopped or prevented from running by reason of strikes or other conditions not caused by or attributable to the said Company.

5. THAT the said sum of \$20,000.00 shall be repayable by the Corporation of the City of Chatham in twenty annual, consecutive instalments of \$1,000.00 each, with interest on the unpaid principal at 4 per cent. per annum, at the end of each year after the date of the making of the advance, and shall be secured by first mortgage by the Company to the Corporation of the City of Chatham, upon all the property, machinery and plant of the Company in the said City of Chatham, which mortgage shall contain the usual Statutory powers, covenants and conditions, and provide for the insurance of the property against fire in favor of the Corporation to the full amount of the said mortgage, and shall contain the personal covenant of the Directors of said Company for the due payment of the first five instalments of principal and interest secured by said mortgage, and shall give to the Company the privilege of paying the whole amount of the said loan at any time during the period of twenty years from the date of making the said advance, and shall in all ways be in form satisfactory to the Corporation, or its Council aforesaid, and shall also contain a proviso that should the Company fail to perform any of the covenants or agreements contained or reserved on its part in its agreement with the Corporation of the City of Chatham, the said

principal sum of \$20,000.00, or as much thereof as shall be unpaid at the time of such failure, together with the accrued interest up to the time of such failure, shall, at the option of the Council of the said Corporation, immediately become due and payable by the Company to the said Corporation.

6. THAT the said Company shall at all times, until it shall have repaid the said sum of \$20,000.00 with interest as aforesaid, permit full and free inspection of its premises, pay rolls and books of account, by or on behalf of the Council of the said Corporation.

7. THAT should the said Company fail to perform and comply with any of the terms or conditions above set forth, then and so soon as such failure of performance and compliance takes place, exemption from taxation and the right to the supply of water free of charge, herebefore respectively provided for, shall cease and be finally determined, and the property of the Company shall forthwith become liable for all taxes as though no such exemption had been granted or provided for.

8. THAT the said Company shall, forthwith after its incorporation, enter into an agreement with the Corporation of the said City of Chatham, satisfactory to the Council thereof, embodying all the terms, conditions, provisions, covenants and agreements herein reserved and contained.

AND WHEREAS it is desired to authorize the entering into an agreement on the part of the Corporation of the City of Chatham with the said Company when incorporated, providing for the granting of the said aid upon the terms and conditions above set forth.

AND WHEREAS, in order to carry out such agreement on the part of the said Corporation of the City of Chatham, it will be necessary to issue debentures to the said Corporation for the sum of \$20,000.00 as hereinafter provided (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law), the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the purpose aforesaid and no other.

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of twenty years, being the current of the said debentures; said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt, shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other nineteen years of said period; and

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by "The Consolidated Municipal Act, 1903," and its amendments to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is \$1,537.52;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the City of Chatham, according to the last revised assessment roll thereof, is \$4,781,837.00;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debt of the said Corporation of the City of Chatham is \$527,699.23 (exclusive of local improvement rates or special tax rates in arrears), no part whereof is in arrears.

THEREFORE, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Chatham enacts as follows:

1. The Municipal Council of the City of Chatham shall grant aid for the promotion of the said manufacture of the nature and conditions herebefore set forth, and the Mayor and Clerk of the said Corporation are hereby authorized to execute an agreement on the part of the said Corporation with the said Company, binding the Corporation upon the said terms and conditions to give said aid.

2. That for the purpose of raising the said sum of \$20,000.00, debentures of the said Corporation to the amount of \$20,000.00, as aforesaid, in sums of not less than \$100.00 each, may be issued on the 1st day of January, A. D. 1908, each of which debentures shall be listed on the due date of issue thereof, and shall be payable within twenty years thereafter at the Standard Bank of Canada, in the said City of Chatham.

3. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the said City of Chatham, or by some other person authorized by by-law to sign the same, and the Treasurer thereof, and the Clerk shall attach thereto the Corporate Seal of the said Corporation.

4. The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2 per centum per annum, payable yearly, and shall be payable in such amounts and at such times that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year in respect of the debt shall be equal as nearly as may be to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other nineteen years of the said period.

5. During the currency of said debentures, there shall be raised annually, by special rate on all the rateable property in the said City of Chatham, the sum of \$1,537.52, for the purpose of paying the amount due or to become due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt.

6. This by-law shall take effect on the final passing thereof.

7. The votes of the Electors of the said City of Chatham shall be taken on this by-law at the following time and places, that is to say: On Wednesday, the 5th day of June, A. D. 1907, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, by the following Deputy Returning Officers:

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 1, at the wagon shop of J. D. Thompson, north side of Grand avenue, and that Joseph Northwood be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 2, at the office formerly occupied by Scott Bros., corner of Thorne and Salter streets, and that Arthur Dunn be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 3, at the office of W. W. Seane, south side of Thames street, and that Robert Brunner be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 4, at the grocery of Fred Bounsell, corner of Murray and Adelaide streets, and that Richard O. Knight be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 5, at the residence of Mrs. Wills, north side of Colborne street, next Campbell's Fanning Mill Factory, and that Isaac Smith be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 6, at the grocery of Chas. T. Cherry, corner King and Princess streets, and that W. O. Bentley be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 7, at the Weigh Scales Office on the Market Square, and that J. M. Northwood be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 8, at the office of Aitken and Wilson, west side of Fifth street, and that James Richardson be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 9, at the office of J. & A. Alder, north side of King street, and that Henry Robinson be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 10, at the grocery of Harry Jacques, corner of Cross and Raleigh streets, and that C. R. Hancock be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 11, at the shop of A. L. Savage, near the corner of Queen and Richmond streets, and that John Turner be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 12, at the residence of Carrie Gray, corner of Queen and Gray streets, and that R. Harrington be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 13, at the residence of Adelaide Lawrence, east side of William street, near Park street, and that James Sterling be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 14, at the Bakery of Joseph Waterhouse, corner of Park and Seane streets, and that James C. Richards be Deputy Returning Officer.

In and for Polling Sub-Division No. 15, at the residence of Patrick Kelly, corner Park avenue and Pine street, and that J. C. Northwood be Deputy Returning Officer.

8. On Friday, the 31st day of May, A. D. 1907, the Mayor of the said City of Chatham shall attend at the City Clerk's Office at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to appoint persons to attend at the various polling places aforesaid and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting or opposing the said passing of this by-law respectively.

9. The Clerk of the Council of the said City of Chatham shall attend at his office in Harrison Hall, in the said City of Chatham, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of Monday, the 10th day of June, A. D. 1907, to sum up the number of votes for and against the said by-law.

Upper American Canal Clear.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., May 13.—For the first time this year the ice was all out of the upper American canal, and no trouble was experienced with it Saturday. The strong south-west wind drove it out.

Bartender Commits Suicide.

Ottawa, May 13.—Early yesterday morning Oliver Deslauriers, a bartender, only three months married, shot himself, his death being instantaneous. There is no explanation for his rash act.

Terrible Disaster in Mexico Copper Mine—Fire Still Raging.

Mexico City, May 13.—Ninety men are supposed to have lost their lives in a fire which started in the Tenares copper mine at Velardena, in the State of Durango, last Friday night. The fire is still raging and is said to be beyond control.

Thirty-five bodies have been recovered. Seventeen miners are known to have escaped. This information has been conveyed in a despatch to the Associated Press office in Mexico City. The burning mine belongs to the Guggenheims.

Entertainers Prince of Wales.

London, May 13.—Ambassador Whitelaw Reid and Mrs. Reid entertained the Prince and Princess of Wales and other distinguished persons at dinner at Dorchester House on Saturday evening. At the request of the Princess, whose first visit it was to the Park lane residence of the American Ambassador, the dinner was quite an informal affair.

Eleven Years For Manslaughter.

Blanchmont, N. Y., May 13.—A jury found guilty in the supreme court last week of manslaughter in the second degree, in causing the death of his father by injuries inflicted during a quarrel, was sentenced by Justice Lyon on Saturday to 11 years at Auburn state prison.

NATIVES PREPARE TO LEAVE.

Eruptions of Stromboli and Etna Continually Increasing.

Messina, May 13.—The eruptions of Etna and Stromboli volcanoes increased as the night came on. An enormous volume of smoke and quantities of red-hot projectiles are being thrown out from Etna in all directions. There are also continued loud explosions and earth shocks. These latter are especially severe at the Etna Observatory, which is at an elevation of 9,000 feet, and only 1,700 feet away from the crater. The observatory lies above the forest district in a zone where scarcely any animal life exists. In winter this is covered with snow and in summer with dry lava.

The latest reports from that island declare the situation to be more terrifying. A few weeks ago Stromboli was covered with rich vegetation; now the island is stricken and desolate, everything having been buried under ashes. Every boat at the island has been pressed into service by the inhabitants to aid in their escape from the danger.

Resembles Vesuvius Eruptions.

Frank A. Perett of New York, assistant director of the Royal Observatory at Mount Vesuvius, and the companion of Prof. Matteucci, the director of the observatory during the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in April, 1906, returned here yesterday, after having visited Mount Etna and Stromboli. He made most important observations and took interesting photographs.

"The disturbances much resemble those which preceded the eruption of Mount Vesuvius last year. The smoke is now more dense and the dynamic force in the main craters has increased. The roaring of the volcanoes and the violent discharges gives the impression that stronger eruptions are imminent."

Grey Ashes Fall.

Naples, May 13.—Enormous clouds of grey ashes appeared Saturday from the sea, darkened the sky and fell on the town. Considerable apprehension was felt when it was realized that the clouds were ashes and cinders from Mount Etna and Stromboli. A similar phenomenon was noticed along the southern coast and caused panics in several places.

PERKINS' BODY EXHUMED.

Kidneys Had Not Been Removed—Crown Evidence at Fault.

Cayuga, May 13.—The exhumation of the body of Henry Perkins has resulted in the discovery that the kidneys had not been removed for medical examination, although Dr. Bauer of Hamilton, in testifying for the crown at the recent trial of Mrs. Mattie Perkins on the murder charge, declared that to the best of his understanding the organs had been taken to Toronto for analysis by Dr. Ellis, and had not been returned.

It is understood that the remains were brought to light at the request of the widow, who wished to have it established that the crown had erred in its evidence as to one of the particulars of the autopsy. She regards the discovery as of considerable importance, and has communicated with Gideon Grant of Toronto, associate counsel for the defence during the late proceedings.

The exhumation was carried out in the presence of Dr. Snider, J. C. Coulter (solicitor), Rev. Mr. Howard of the Presbyterian Church, Ralph Curry, a brother of Mrs. Perkins; Mr. Heaslip, a brother-in-law, and Mr. Grant, a local timber merchant.

So successfully has the embalming process been performed that the body showed little trace of decomposition, although several months have passed since the burial. Surrounded by the little group in the cemetery, Dr. Snider went through with the operation of removing the kidneys. One was found practically untouched, while the other was partially gone. They were placed in a jar and sealed, and will be sent to Toronto.

Before the trial of Mrs. Perkins opened, the defence applied to the Attorney-General for power to have the remains exhumed, but the department showed hesitancy, and the matter was dropped.

Mr. Grant, for the defence, has served The Toronto Star with notice that a suit will be brought for alleged libel in certain published matter relating to the proceedings of the defence.
