LYNN WAS DISCHARGED

Case Brought Against Him By Reaume Was Weak

Vincent Connelly Of Dresden Is Sentenced To One Month

The June Sessions of the County Court opened in the Court House yesterday afternoon. The Grand Jury, which was addressed briefly by Judge Ball, was composed of the following: F. Arnold, L. Brown, W. D. Craig, John Drury, Arthur Fenning, W. C. Gordon, Arthur Henderson, Thos. A. King, Chas. E. Satter, H. H. Mills, John C. Oliver, Wm. Thompson and W. A. Hunter. Mr. Fenning was appointed Foreman. Two true bills were filed, one against Vincent Connelly, on three indictments, and one against John McIntosh. Judge Dowlin presided over the criminal cases.

Vincent Connelly, of Dresden, who pleaded guilty to three charges of receiving stolen goods, was sentenced to one month in the common jail on the three charges, his sentence to run concurrently.

R. E. Towers and G. E. Weir were counsel for the defence, and Crown Attorney H. D. Smith prosecuted. The line of defence was well arranged, and the idea apparently was to get Connelly off with a fine. The witnesses called for the defence were, the prisoner's mother and his young wife, ex-Mayor T. F. Hinnegan, of Wallaceburg, and Dr. Sivas, of Dresden.

From the evidence produced it was clearly shown that drink was the cause of Vincent Connelly's downfall. Dr. Sivas testified that Connelly was now almost a mental and physical wreck as the result of dissipation, and it was shown that he received the stolen goods while under the influence of liquor. Mr. Hinnegan said that Connelly had always been a model young man. He at one time worked in Mr. Hinnegan's flax mill and he had proved himself to be a trustworthy employee. Mrs. Connelly, the mother of the prisoner, said it was after Connelly went into the Clifford House at Dresden that he went to the bad. He started drinking and got in bad company.

If there was anything which might have moved the Court to deal leniently with the prisoner it was the sight of his young wife, who sat in the courtroom with her baby in her arms. She watched the proceedings with deep anxiety, plaiting her hair on her face. Beside her sat Connelly's mother. Both appeared to be very much depressed when sentence was passed upon the prisoner.

John McIntosh, also of Dresden, who was up charged with stealing chickens, was fined \$25 without costs. The Judge was disposed to deal leniently with him on account of his youth and previously good character. Drink was also at the bottom of McIntosh's indiscretion.

The case of Rex vs. Lynn was probably the one in which most local interest centred. This was the case where George Reaume, of Dover, charged Robert Lynn, a local barber, with the theft of \$140. Immediately after the evidence had been taken and all argument in, Judge Dowlin discharged Lynn without further comment. There was absolutely nothing in the evidence which could convict him.

The evidence given by George Reaume, the complainant, was the most damaging against his own case. He admitted that he was helplessly drunk on the day that he alleged he lost his money. He was not a very bright witness, and he was constantly contradicting himself. According to his own evidence, he went to sleep in Lynn's barber shop while he was in a drunken stupor. When he woke up he missed his money. It was shown that he had been drinking brandy and beer during the day, and had been flourishing his wad of money in some of the bar-rooms he frequented.

Frank Barnier, Reaume's chum, who went the rounds with him on the day in question, gave out some interesting facts under cross-examination. Apparently Frank was having a big time at the time Reaume lost his money, and for some time afterwards. He boasted that he spent as much as \$34 in drink in two weeks in Detroit following the alleged robbery. He left Reaume at the Grand Central Hotel, and went down to Dunk Vickers's barber shop, where he had a shave. In the meantime, Reaume went to Lynn's. Barnier afterwards went down to Lynn's, where he found Reaume helpless. He carried him out to the banks of the creek at the back of the barber shop and then left him for a time. He returned later with Mayor Stone, whom he asked to accompany him. As soon as he woke Reaume up he asked him where his money was. It was then that the complainant first missed his wad. A search was made for it, but it could be found nowhere.

Other witnesses who were called were, Officer Peter Dezella and Mayor Stone.
