

NORTH PERTH PROTEST.

Filed Against Mr. Brown.

Toronto, Aug. 23 .- The particulars of charges against the election of John Brown in North Perth will be filed this morning at Osgoode Hall. There are 125 counts, involving the payment of money for votes, the intimidation of voters, the opening of timidation of voters, the opening of hotels on election day, the distribution of liquor by the agents of a respondent, and many other charges of a corrupt nature. With John Brown are coupled the names of the Hon. J. R. Stratton and James Vance, Liberal organizer in Ontario. An attempt will be made to prove that Brown, Stratton, Vance and others received a large sum of money at their headquarters at the Grand Central Hotel, Listowel, and that the workers were called in, being told that the money had arrived for the election. The respondent in his experiments for a discovery admits election. The respondent in his ex-amination for a discovery admits the payment for livery rig to take voters to the polls. This act is enough to disqualify the respondent unless he is given the benefit of the saving clause of the act, which de-clares that the candidate may be re-lieved from the penalty of disqualifi-cation if no corrupt act was intend-

The particulars in the Muskoka election appeal will also be filed to-day. There is a long list of charges of corrupt practices. The particulars the other election cases will in the other election cases will not be filed till next week.
