G. W. V. A. FUTURE LIES IN EARL HAIGS HANDS

OTTAWA, June 24.—The destiny of the Great War Veterans' Association, formed of ex-service men after the war, with its assets of \$8,000,000, records, amenities and membership, lies in the hands of Field Marshal Earl Haig, former Commander of the British armies in France, according to resolutions adopted unanimously at the seventh annual convention of the Association here this afternoon.

onvention of the Association here this afternoon.

In accordance with former declarations and the expressed wishes of Field Marshal Earl Haig, the Association undertakes to proceed without delay to wards the complete unity of Canadian exservice men and subscribes without reservation to the establishment in this Dominion of the British Legion in Canada under the direction and leadership of the "Grand President of the British Empire Service League" the resolution states. The Associtation will tender to Earl Haig assurance of unqualified cooperation to this end, and the assets, records, amenities and membership of the body, with full authority to complete negotiations on behalf of the G.W. V.A. requesting guarantees only in respect of three matters.

These matters are:

(1)—That the ideals upheld by the G.W.V.A., as set forth in the Association's declaration of principles be preserved:

(2)—That negotiations in respect of

transfer and consolidation in respect of transfer and consolidation be conducted as to ensure maintenance of organization throughout, to safeguard the interests of minorities, classes with peculiar needs, the needy, disabled and dependent

(3)—That satisfactory service facili-ies be continuously maintained as to mable independent and democratic ex-ression of opinion in respect of veterans egislative questions and for the adjust-nent of individual claims.
