President Hill Looking to Canada.

President Hill, of the Great
Northern Railway, wants closer
Canadian relations and asks some
pungent questions as to what the
United States is going to do in the
future. He sees ahead for the
millions of people in the future.

Speaking at St. Paul, last week,
Mr. Hill spoke freely regarding
commercial conditions in the
States. He pointed out that the
United States is prosperous, but
if they got down, however, to a
close examination, they would
readily see that the nation is living
profligately. "We are selling out
our natural resources, exploiting
them as fast as we can without
building up industries and trade
relations to take their place when
exhausted.

"It is only a question of time till
our timber is exhausted. Our
public domain is all gone and the
nation cannot longer boast that it
has homes for all. Where are the
immigrants rushing to our shores
to end up? Not on the land; we
have no more to offer them. They
must crowd the cities."

"When this nation has one hun-
dred and fifty million people they
will have to do something else than
exploit natural resources to earn
a living. We will eventually have
to meet the commercial competi-
tion England is meeting today and
have to face such problems as she
is now facing with 1,500,000 un-
employed crying for bread with no
bread to feed, save as charity doles
it out to them."

Mr. Hill closed his address with
expressing a hope that steps would

be taken to conserve the national
resources before it was too late
and to establish better trade re-
lations, so that foreign markets
might be had for the increasing
output of local industries.

He especially urges better trade
relations with Canada. He said:
"We must have closer trade re-
lations with Canada. England
formerly bought three-fourths of
our exports. In a few years she
will get so much wheat from the
Canadian Northwest she will need
none of ours."

Is the Great Northern Behind It?

In our advertising columns our
readers will find yet another notice
of a proposed new railroad which
will come into Medicine Hat,
and those who wish to see railroad
competition here, and watch closely
the trend of current events, are
of opinion that the Great Northern
Railroad Company is behind these
propositions. This view appears
to be general at Lethbridge and
Calgary. At the latter city there
appears to be many prominent
men opposed to offering any en-
couragement to the Great Northern
to come into their city.

Mr. William Whyte, C.P.R., on Great Northern Advent.

A special message from Mon-
real, states that Mr. William
Whyte, replying to a question,
said he did not think the proposed
lines of J. J. Hill in the west
would divert much traffic to the
United States. "Our rates are
cheaper than those of the Great
Northern," he said, "so I do not
think new lines, which are simply
intended to be feeders of the Great
Northern, will take much Canadian
traffic. It would not be to the
interest of Great Northern to cut
their rates below the usual tariff in
order to get that traffic. Our
people realize that the money they
spend on the United States rail-
ways does not come into the
country again, whereas that spent
on railways in Canada, provides
work for our people and builds up
our own institutions."

What Boys Cost.

Some age has figured out that
the average boy who is dependent
upon his parents for a livelihood
until he reaches the age of 21
years, cost them \$4,000. Upon
this basis of calculation a brood
for instance, of six boys will repre-
sent an outlay of \$24,000 by the
time they leave their home roof.
The question naturally arises, does
it pay to raise boys, and are there
no other crops that would be more
profitable? If a boy turns out to
be a cigarette fiend with a laugh
that would make the wild un-
tamed donkey feel perfectly at
home in his society, and with an
untrammeled and unconquerable
desire to avoid work, it is safe to
say the parents might have in-
vested to better advantage. But if
the boy grows up with the lesson
well learned that wealth and
success grow only on bushes by the
sweat of the brow, the parents
need not begrudge whatever they
have spent on him, for he will be a
source of increasing joy and pride to
them when they grow old and their
hands tremble, and their steps
are slow and faltering. They
will then have two strong arms to
lean upon. - Ex.
