FLORENCEVILLE BRIDGE DAMAGED

The ice ran out Thursday night
and contrary to the prediction of
every one familiar with bridge
building and ice running condi-
tions on the St. John, the Flo-
renceville bridge is still standing.
The advantage was in delay.
The weather turned colder the
last few days, the water went
down several feet, and when the
jam broke the ice battered against
the pier at a point below the dam-
aged part. The ice jam was fol-
lowed by about 250,000 feet log
jam belonging to different lumber
operators. About one-quarter of
the nose of No. 3 pier from east
side was carried away, the plank-
ing on No. 4 pier torn off nearly
the whole length and side of pier
quite badly scored.

D. W. Jackson, county bridge
inspector, will not make sugges-
tions about the repairs necessary
until after the engineers make an
examination.

In the fall of '83 piers for the
first bridge were built across the
river here. Mr. Jackson was
master mechanic at the time, and
Mr. Beckwith provincial engi-
neer. Arch buttress spans were
built, and it was partly completed
in the spring of '84 but when the
ice went out the bridge went with
it. It was replaced in '85 with
new superstructure and the piers
repaired. In 1911 three steel
spans were put on. A few years
previous to this the two short
spans were replaced with covered
spans.

Tobique Log Driving Company

At the annual meeting of the
Tobique River Log Driving Com-
pany, held recently in St. John,
the following directors were
elected: F. C. Beateay, Donald
Fraser, Archibald Fraser, J. D.
McLauchlan, H. Usher Miller.
The officers elected were F. C.
Beateay, president; J. C. Hart-
ley, secretary-treasurer. A con-
tract was entered into with J. D.
McLauchlan for the driving of
the logs from the following places
for another year. From the
Forks of the Tobique river; from
Two Brooks; from Gulaquo and
Burnt Land Brook; from Waps-
kehegan; from points below;
from the Forks of the Tobique
river to the Tobique Manufac-
turing Company's mill pond.

Religion and the War

and rum drinking, theatres and
moving pictures, etc., are count-
enanced if not approved of.

I was hoping that we, as a pro-
vince and a dominion, would at
least enact laws to prohibit the

manufacture, sale and use of in-
toxicating drinks until the war is
over, and then we would see that
it would pay us richly to contin-
ue in this good way. I am
afraid that if our good king and
his advisers, both in the home
land and all his dominions, do
not learn the lessons quickly that
the Lord will allow us to be near-
ly destroyed. Let us arise to
our duty and privilege in regard
to the claims of vital godliness
and true national greatness and
goodness, and thus be a praise in
the earth and a glory to our
Maker.

Believes People Must Turn to God

This was one of the striking
passages from the charge of the
Lord Bishop of Montreal deliv-
ered to the Diocesan Synod, in
which he spoke of the church's
mission in the war:

"With all my heart I believe
that God is saving us by His pow-
er from defeat in spite of our
many blunders, that God is with-
holding victory because if victory
came to a people morally and spir-
itually unprepared it would injure
rather than help them; with all
my heart I believe that God is
prolonging the day of our tribula-
tion in order to give us time,
to repent and turn to Him, that
victory may find us ready to use
our power for His glory and the
good of mankind and not only for
our own selfish advantage and
national enrichment."

"With all my heart I believe
that just as soon as this people
does turn to God and put its trust
in Him, and dedicate its life to
Him, then will the days of our
tribulation be shortened and vic-
tory will crown our effort, because
God will be in the power of our
army and navy and when God is
fighting for us no power of
Heaven, or earth, or Hell can de-
feat us. It is God's power that
will determine the issues of this
war, not men's."

Death of E. D. Phillips

The death occurred on Wed-
nesday at his home at Pembroke
of E. D. Phillips, after a weeks
illness from measles followed by
pneumonia, aged 59 years. The
deceased leaves five children,
three daughters, Mrs. Harry
Sharpe of Pembroke and Mrs.
Leonard Scott of Edmonton, Alta.,
and two sons, Wilfred and Leslie
at home. The funeral was held
Friday, the Rev. George Kincaid
of Hartland officiating.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY IN MAINE

Aroostook county officers have
been notified of a shooting trage-
dy at Westfield last week. The
information was to the effect that
Willis Bell of Westfield shot his
wife probably fatally and later
killed himself. Jealousy was
given as the motive.

The shooting took place in the
home of Fred Densmore, at East-
ton, five miles north of Westfield,
where the woman was employed
as housekeeper. Bell went to the
house during the night and, ac-
cording to the officials, fired six
shots at his wife, three of which
took effect. He then drove back
to his home in the outskirts of
the village of Westfield and shot
himself.

They had been married about
ten years, and had three children.
Their age was about thirty-three
years.
