

PRIVY COUNCIL ALLOW APPEAL OF COMPANY WITH COSTS AGAINST GOVERNMENT INTEREST. COMPANY CAN NOW PROCEED WITH ACTION AGAINST COMMISSION.

Toronto, April 7 .- Canadian associated press despatches today indicate that electrical development company interests, (MacKenzie Mann) us-e secured an important initial victory before the Privy Council in their fight against the Ontario hydro electric (Government) commission and the Attorney General of Ontario, when that highest court allowed with costs the appeal of the company against these government interests. This judgment permits the electrical company to proceed with their action against the commission to determine the validity of powers given by Ontario to the commission to develop certain wa terpowers in the Welland and Niagara rivers. The Lower courts held that this action could not be comfiat of Attorney General of Ontario who refused it.
